The town of 2,300 people triples during rodeo week, as 450 pro rodeo cowboys and cowgirls. and 15,000 fans make their way to the Kansas' Biggest Rodeo arena a mile north of town on Highway

Kansas' Biggest Rodeo kicks off at 8 p.m. each evening. The rodeo features two unique specialty acts this year. Troy Lerwill, "the Wild Child," has entertained at the National Finals Rodeo. In his act, he jumps a motorbike over a truck and sixty foot trailer. Lerwill, an eight-time Pro Rodeo Cowboys Association Comedy Act of the Year winner, will also work the barrel in Phillipsburg.

The second specialty act is Erik Martonovich's Big Horse Productions. He and a team of riders bring eight Belgian geldings to town, and he roman-rides the Belgians as the other riders vault from horse to horse, performing "equine gymnastics" on the beasts as they gallop around the arena

Phillipsburg rodeo fans will recognize the familiar face and voice of eleven time Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Announcer of the Year Randy Corley, who has worked the Phillipsburg rodeo at least 25 years. Bullfighter duties will be shared by Dusty Tuckness, Meteetse, Wyo., and Greg Rumohr, Rio Vista, Texas. And the bulls and broncs will be provided by Bennie and Rhett Beutler, the father/son duo of Beutler and Son Rodeo. Colo., Elk City, Okla. The Beutler family has brought livestock to Kansas' Biggest Rodeo since

Educators adopt policy statement

With 140 educators from Kansas voting on the matter, delegates to the 2011 National Education Association recently adopted a policy statement on teacher evaluation and accountability. Over 9,000 educators from across the country attended the annual meeting and Representative Assembly, this year in Chicago. Like the Kansas association, delegates meet to discuss issues and vote on new business items and resolutions.

Disheartened with badly designed evaluation systems, delegates believe it is crucial to demand greater responsibility for their profession.

The association's proposal on teacher evaluation calls for an overhaul of teacher evaluation and accountability systems. It also calls for members to take responsibility for ensuring the development, implementation and enforcement of these high quality systems.

As a result of this vote, New Education Association is in a better position to fight the attacks of special interests groups and 'reformists' who continue to unfairly target educators," said Kansas New Education Association President Blake West. "The voice of teachers and educators must not be silenced or marginalized by people who don't have a clue what great teaching is."

Delegates discussed and voted on school funding, especially recent cuts to education, validated the importance of standing together with parents and community members to defend public schools and set the policy for the association for the coming year. Keynote speakers included Vice President Joe Biden, educators from districts succeeding in the association's Priority Schools program and the "Wisconsin 14," the state senators named the 2011 Friend of Education who stalled Governor Scott Walker from
