West continues winning streak at Shrine Bowl

The 38th annual Kansas Shrine Bowl All-Star Football Game was held for the third time at Lewis Field Stadium at Fort Hays State University in Hays on Saturday evening and the West winning streak continued by a 30-7 score.

The West has never lost to the East when the game is played in Hays and the victorious West has now won the game played to raise money for the Shriners Hospitals six straight years.

Seeing lots of action for the West squad was Terrell Lane, Norton's powerful 5'11", 220 pound tailback. In his four years at Norton Community High School, Lane rushed for 5,011 yards and 59 touchdowns. On Saturday evening, he added another 104 yards and one touchdown on 15 carries for an average of 7 yards per carry in his final high school competition.

He will play football this fall for Hutchinson Community College.

Lane was second highest rusher for the West. Gaining just a few more yards was Dreamius Smith of Wichita Heights, who rushed for 132 yards on 14 carries and was selected as the Most Valuable Player for the West.

Also playing for the West squad were Reggie Jordan, Hill City, cornerback; Josh Nixon, Smith Center, defensive tackle and Derek Racette, Hutchinson Trinity, quarterback.

The first half was played on fairly even terms with the West scoring the only touchdown. Racette's two-vard run and two-point conversion off a fake kick with 6:04 left in the second quarter made the score 8-0 at halftime.

The West dominated the second half. The West's second touchdown was set up by a 47-yard dash by Lane who was stopped on the East 10-yard line by the last defender. Smith ran the final 10 yards for the score that made it 14-0 with 5:08 left in the third quarter.

On the West's next possession, Racette passed to Kellan Hernandez of Meade for a 66-yard touchdown and the West led 20-0 with 2:28 left in the third period.

Lane scored his touchdown on a 2-yard run with 10:13 remaining in the game, capping a nine-play, 45-yard drive. Jordan Nelson of Manhattan ran for

two extra points and the West extended their lead

The East's only touchdown came on a defensive play when Topeka Hayden linebacker Alec Steuber returned a Racette fumble 49 yards with 5:11 left in the game. The extra point kick was good and it was 28-7.

Atwo-point safety when the center snap on an East punt from their end zone went over the punter's head with 2:37 left made the final score 30-7.

The West had 19 first downs compared to just 6 for the East.

The West gained 350 yards on the ground on 60 rushes for an average of 5.8 yards per carry.

The West defense limited the East's single wing offense to just 7 yards on 22 carries.

Eighty-four yards passing gave the West a total of 434 yards of offense. The East had 94 passing

Head coach of the West team was Rick Wheeler, Wichita Heights. His assistant coaches were Brian Hill, Garden City; Dan Adelhardt, Kapaun-Mt. Carmel; Jeff Geist, Abilene; Sean Racette, Trinity and Brett Kendrick, Stanton County.
