Music festival brings performers to Holbrook

It may be a small, rural town, but come August 12 and 13, Holbrook will host the impressive Burton's Bend Music Festival, an event that brings together country, Americana, jazz, gospel, bluegrass and even rock-'n-'roll music for all ages to enjoy.

It's a mix of concerts, theme shows, workshops and old-time opry-style shows, all presented in the intimate and nostalgic setting of the renovated Holbrook school house. It's now the home of the Central Plains Foundation, the organization that presents this top-shelf event for music fans across south-central Nebraska and north-central Kansas.

Headlining the 2011 event are Alexa Whipple, emerging young artist from Arapahoe, Neb., and Roger Tibbs, internationally known singer from New Zealand, who will both be performing each evening of the event. Also sharing their talents with festival-goers will be area trio "Three 4 All," Elton Flodman from Hordville, Neb.; Tex and Mary Schutz from Texas; Pat Boilesen from Albion, Neb., Janet McBride from Texas and many others.

Activities begin at 10 a.m. each morning and continue until about 10 p.m. Mornings will be comprised of various theme shows, including a yodeling showcase, a rock'n'roll review, a gospel music "gatherin'," a bluegrass music jam session and a jazz and pop memory show. Afternoons begin at 1 p.m. with a Young Entertainers' Showcase (both days) followed by concert sets by various artists. Evenings

are comprised of headline concerts (beginning at 7 p.m.) and an opry-style show called "Burton's Bend Barndance" beginning at about 9 p.m. A second stage offers sign-up opportunities for anyone who wishes to perform a few numbers for the festival audience. Participants may call 308-962-7555 to pre-register or they may sign up when they arrive. Young performers are encouraged to register for the Young Entertainers' Showcase as well and should call ahead for a spot.

The festival takes its name from the first permanent settler of Furnas County, Isaac Burton. Burton established the Burton's Bend Trading Post in 1870. The trading post grew into the town known as Burton's Bend. Once the railroad came through, the name was changed to Holbrook.

The Burton's Bend Music Festival is made possible through the support of the Nebraska Arts Council, the Nebraska Cultural Endowment and the Village of Holbrook. Sponsors include ATC Communications, Hunt Nebraska, Golight, Inc., T&M Farms, First State Bank-Holbrook, First Central Bank-Arapahoe, the Buffalo Commons Storytelling Festival, Culligan Water Conditioning and Adams Construction.

Have you seen the latest displays of collections at the Norton Public Library?

Dawn Berry shares a display of Australian artifacts, including crocodile skin, the tanned skin of a two-year-old crocodile. The heavy projecting scales help protect the crocodile from predators.

Boomerang, also called Kylie, is a long-range weapon used by aborigines for over 25,000 years. They are used for hunting, tribal warfare and as musical instruments. Aboriginal art ("The Dreamtime") is aboriginal peoples' term for the era of creation. The art illustrates the Dreamtime stories, the animals of Australia and the traditional life of the aboriginal people.

The display also includes music CD's, a Bullroarer (Bush

telephone) and illustrations of the Great Barrier Reef, Fraser Island and Tasmanian devils.

Jeanette Lacy prepared a display of native American pottery, blankets, rugs and weavings. This collection was assembled by members of her family to represent another culture.

Beverly Kindler's collection includes china and glassware. Her interest in china and glassware comes from admiring the many examples in the china cabinets at the homes of her grandmothers, as well as in her family home. Her collection includes china and glassware from those china cabinets.
