Crash causes minor injuries

Three individuals escaped major injury early Thursday afternoon when two vehicles were involved in a crash on Highway 36 in front of Pamida.

Norton Police Officer Wes DuBois reported Thursday that just before 1:30 p.m. Thursday, a late-model Ford Freestyle was stopped on Highway 36, preparing to turn south on Jones Street. The crash occurred when the driver of a Dodge Ram truck struck the first vehicle from behind.

The driver of the Ford was transported to the Norton County Hospital with minor injuries and a passenger in the vehicle was uninjured. The driver of the second vehicle was also not injured. The names of the occupants have not been released pending investigation into the crash.

Responding to the crash were the Norton Police Department, the Norton County Sheriff's Department, and members of the Kansas Highway Patrol. DuBois said that an investigation into the incident is ongoing and citations are pending.
