On approximately Tuesday, September 13 a bridge repair job on US-36 Highway is anticipated to begin in Phillips County.

The bridge over Spring Creek is located 1.5 miles east of the East US-183 Junction in Phillipsburg. During construction, traffic will be reduced to one lane and controlled by temporary traffic signals. "This is necessary to allow the contractors enough space on each side of the roadway to make repairs to the structure," explains Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) Area One Construction Engineer Jim Riener, who will be overseeing the project.

KDOT awarded the construction contract of approximately \$135,669 to King Construction Company, of Hesston. Subcontractors on the job include: APAC Kansas, Inc. - Shears Division, of Hays (asphalt material); J & J Contractors, Inc., of Iola, (guardrail); Klaver Construction Co., Inc., Kingman (concrete safety barrier); Smoky Valley
