Norton Cross country teams win championship

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Head coach George Rossi's Norton Community High School girls and boys cross country teams both opened the 2011 season in championship fashion by winning the Norton Invitational Meet for the third year in a row on Thursday on the Prairie Dog Association Golf Course south of Norton.

It was the sixth straight championship of the Norton event for the Lady Jays.

The Norton boys placed third three years ago and second four years ago after having won three years in a row.

"The heat was on today," said coach Rossi. "I don't recall a race being as hot as it was to-

Norton sophomore Darcy Bainter was first to hit the finish line for the Lady Jays. She was third in 18:16 for the 2.5

mile course. Sophomore Katelyn Engelbert finished fifth in 18:43 and junior Julia Kent placed tenth in 19:49. Finishing just behind Kent in 11th place was sophomore Marisa Maddy in 19:50 and just behind her in 12th place was junior Kamilla Jones with a clocking of 20:13.

These five girls made up the Norton team score.

Also running for Norton and their finishes and times were: freshman Sierra Griffith, 16th, 21:38 and freshman Jesika Smith, 27th, 24:09.

"Winning is a great way to start the season," said coach Rossi. "Our times were not as good as last year but that was the case for just about everyone, not just our girls.

"Darcy ran very well along with Katelyn. Julia, Marisa and Kamilla who were all within two minutes of Darcy and that is an important statistic to us.

"We need to close the 1-5 split down. The freshmen Sierra and Jesika learned that cross country is a very difficult sport.


