Creighton's National Soccer Player of the Week has relatives in Norton

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Brian Holt, a senior soccer goalkeeper for No.2 nationally ranked Creighton University, was named National Player of the Week by College Soccer News and honored as a member of the National Team of the Week by Top Drawer Soccer. com after his record-setting Sept.18-24 week in net.

He posted two more clean sheets during the week and had played more than 719 minutes without allowing a goal this season, while extending his shutout streak to better than 739 minutes.

Holt stopped five shots against the second-highest scoring team in the nation on Sept. 21 as he and his Bluejay teammates blanked No.22 Kentucky 2-0. The Omaha native then turned away six shots by Saint Mary's to record his seventh solo shutout of the season in the 1-0 win, keeping Creighton unscored upon through eight matches to start the season.

Holt eclipsed his own school record for consecutive minutes played without allowing a goal. As of that week, he had played 739.47 minutes since last allowing a goal last year. That mark surpassed the scoreless streak of 722.12 he set as a freshman in 2008. The fifth year keeper moved his Creighton University and Missouri Valley Conference shutout record to 34 career clean sheets, while dropping his career goals against average to .069, second best in the school and league history. Holt also captured his 44th career win during the week, trailing only Jay Fitzgerald's 53 victories in school history.

As of that week, the Bluejays were the only team in the NCAA which had yet to yield a goal in 2011. Holt's 0.00 goals against average and perfect save percentage both lead the NCAA. Creighton (8-0-0) and

Connecticut (8-0-0) were the only two remaining undefeated and untied teams in the nation.

For the same week, Holt received his third weekly accolade from the Missouri Valley Conference when he was named MVC Defensive Player of the Week.

The Bluejays' eight-game winning streak was snapped last Friday night, however, when they lost 1-0 to third ranked nationally Maryland. The Terrapins' winning goal not only stopped Creighton's scoreless streak but also ended Holt's school-record shutout streak at 753.34. The eight straight shutouts by Creighton were a school record.

Maryland came into the match having scored 28 goals in its first 10 games to lead the nation.



Norton JV football edged by Phillipsburg, 12-8

Neither team scored in the first half. Norton defensive lineman Kolton Harting stopped a Panther offensive drive by sacking the quarterback on the last play of the half.

Caysean Campbell got a good kickoff return to start the second half and Norton moved downfield. Phillipsburg stopped them short of the goalline, however, and scored the first points of the game. The Panther two-point conversion attempt was stuffed by a swarm of Blue Jays, leaving the score at 6-0.

After the kickoff, Norton drove downfield again and appeared to be going for a touchdown. A counter right to Austin Hager brought the ball within five yards of a score but a turnover kept them out of the end zone.

The next time they got the

ball, the Blue Jays scored. Following a series of option keepers, quarterback Dalton Miller found the end zone on a wedge play. A two-point conversion try was stopped short but Phillipsburg was flagged for a face mask penalty. The second try was successful as fullback Jared Bohl powered into the end zone to put the Jays on top 8-6.

Phillipsburg scored their final touchdown on a deep pass with about five minutes left in the game. The two-point try was stopped by Norton, leaving

the score at 12-8 in favor of the Panthers.

After the kickoff, Norton drove downfield again but got only as far as the Panther 25yard line before turning the pigskin over to the home team after a fourth down pass failed with 1:24
