Weather service predicts below normal snowfall for parts of state

With prevailing La Nina weather patterns in the Pacific Ocean, the National Weather Service office in Goodland has issued a report predicting up to 20 percent below-normal snowfall in parts of western Kansas this winter.

According to information from the National Weather Service's Weather Information News Data newsletter, La Nina is a weather pattern characterized by unusually cold sea temperatures in the equatorial Pacific Ocean. This will be the second consecutive winter influenced by La Nina.

The Weather Service issued a map this week, indicating that typical La Nina influence could bring up to 15 percent less snowfall than normal to the far western portion of Kansas and up to 20 percent less than normal in the southwest corner of the state.

The area of the state expected to see up to 15 percent less than normal snowfall spans the northern half of the state, from the Colorado border to Atwood. The area that could see up to 20 percent below normal snowfall covers the southwest corner of the state from Colorado northeast to Garden City and north to Sharon Springs.

With La Nina, the report states, the winter outlook for this year calls for below-normal precipitation and abovenormal temperatures for much of the high plains. This may not be good news, though, because portions of the state already experiencing drought conditions need moisture through the winter.
