A crowd of about 30 Veterans and supporters gathered Tuesday morning at the Norton American Legion Post #63 to meet and hear comments from the American Legion's National Commander Fang Wong.

As National Commander who took up the position on Sept. 1, Wong is traveling around Kansas to visit American Legion posts and talk with Legion members about issues important to military veterans.

One of the main topics of discussion in Wong's visit to Norton was the new version of the GI Bill, which allocates funding for former soldiers who would like to complete a college education. Wong reported that the latest version of the program is an improved version of the Montgomery GI Bill because recipients are receiving adequate funding and payments are arriving in a timely manner.

Wong also spoke strongly about his decision to join the American Legion as a veteran and his definition of a potential Legion member. The Commander related a story of his school days in New York City when he received an American Legion scholarship and, being touched by the organization's generosity, decided from a young age that he wanted to be part of an organization that serves others.

After 20 years of military service, Wong did finally join the American Legion, but learning 20 years too late that he was eligible to join when he first joined the United States Army.

"My definition of a Veteran is anyone who has served even one day in the military," Wong expressed. "If you have served, you are a Veteran and you are eligible for American Legion membership."

An Oberlin man has been charged with first-degree murder this week in connection with the death of an Oberlin man over the weekend.

Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt's office reported Tuesday that Dylan Robert Coryell, Jr., 24, of Oberlin, was charged with first-degree premeditated murder and an alternative count of first-degree felony murder in connection with the death of Corey Ryan Cook, 22, also of Oberlin. Coryell is also charged with aggravated battery and aggravated burglary.

Upon the request of Decatur County Attorney Steven Hirsch, the Attorney General's office will prosecute the case. Nicole Romine, assistant attorney general posted in Goodland, will lead the prosecution team. The Kansas Bureau of Investigation worked with local law enforcement officers from the Oberlin Police Department and Decatur County Sheriff's Office in the investigation.

A release issued by the Decatur County Sheriff's Department on Sunday said that the call came in around 1:34 a.m. of a person being shot at the house at 2048 N Lane, in the Big Timber district of Altory Township. The house is north and west of Jennings and about half a mile west of the Big Timber Cemetery.

Mr. Cook was taken by ambulance to the Decatur County Hospital, then flown to the Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney, Neb.

Corey, said his dad, Todd Cook, was part of the 823rd Special Tactics Unit out of Moody Air Force Base in Georgia. He had been at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, for school, graduated and was on his way to Georgia. His dad said he had two weeks to get there and had come home for a visit.

Mr. Cook graduated from Decatur
