Blue Jays headed for semi-finals in Sub-State basketball

Coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School No.3 seeded boys basketball team opened Class 3A post-season play with a solid 62-52 victory over No.6 seeded Southwestern Heights on Monday in the NCHS Stull Gym in Norton.

The win moved the Blue Jays (12-9) into the semi-finals versus No.2 seeded Holcomb (14-7) at 6 p.m. Thursday at host school Scott City. Holcomb defeated No.7 seeded Phillipsburg 74-47 (8-12) on Monday.

In other first round games on Monday, No.1 seeded Scott City (20-1) defeated No.8 seeded Goodland (6-14) 70-35 and No.4 seeded Lakin (11-10) outscored No.5 seeded Cimarron (10-11) 52-32.

Scott City and Lakin will play at 7:30 p.m. in Scott City on Thursday.

Although Norton broke away from an early 13all tie in the first quarter and led 41-24 late in the second quarter, the visitors from Southwestern Heights kept it interesting. They crawled back into the game and cut the Blue Jay advantage to less than double digits the rest of the way.

"We didn't make it easy on ourselves," said coach Reusink. "We'd get a good lead and then give it back up but we made plays when we needed to.

"Offensively, we handled their full court press well.

"It was an emotional roller coaster at times as we let little things hurt us.

"Our effort was good but we don't always play smart.'

Norton senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier returned from an injury absence and immediately made his presence known on the offensive end. Norton outscored Southwestern Heights 16-13 in the first quarter and Wahlmeier scored 8 points on three baskets and two free throws. Senior guard Zach Hartwell buried a three-pointer and junior guard Jacob Brooks swished a trey and two-point basket in the period.

The Blue Jays pulled away in the second quarter where they outscored the visitors 15-9. Wahlmeier, Brooks and senior guard Tye Nickell each hit a basket, senior guard Dillon McConney hit a basket and free throw for a three-point play and junior forward Andrew Ellis ended the first half by burying not one, but two shots from beyond the arc!

Wahlmeier lit up the scoreboard again in the second half. He hit two more baskets and four free throws in the third quarter and four more baskets and a charity toss in the final stanza to end the game with 27 points.

Norton tallied 13 points in the third period compared to 14 for the visitors. McConney hit another basket and free throw and senior post Alec Gilgenbach tallied inside for Norton's other third quarter points.

The Blue Jays outscored Southwestern Heights 18-16 in the final quarter. In addition to Wahlmeier's 9 points, McConney hit another basket and two free throws, Brooks scored on three charities and Nickell hit two free tosses.

Brooks and McConney were the other two double figure scorers for Norton, each tallying 10 points.

Wahlmeier's 27 points came on 10 of 23 twopoint shots for 44 percent accuracy and 7 of 15 free throws for 47 percent. McConney hit 3 of 4 two-point attempts for a net-smoking 75 percent and was a perfect 4 of 4 from the charity stripe. Brooks hit 1 of 3 from long range for 33 percent, 2 of 10 two-point tries for 20 percent, 3 of 13 overall for 23 percent and was a deadeye 3 of 4 from the free throw line for 75 percent.

Leading scorer for the Mustangs was Clayton Chase with 14 points; Ben Johnsrud and Nathan Johnsrud each scored 12.

As a team, Norton hit 4 of 12 from long range for 33 percent, 17 of 44 two-point attempts for 39 percent and 21 of 56 overall for 38 percent.

Southwestern Heights swished 4 of 13 trey tries for 31 percent, 15 of 44 two-point tries for 34 percent and 19 of 57 overall for 33 percent.

From the free throw line, the Blue Jays swished 16 of 26 for 62 percent and the Mustangs hit 10 of 14 for 71 percent.

Norton outrebounded Southwestern Heights 32-26. The Blue Jays pulled down 8 offensive and 24 defensive rebounds and the Mustangs grabbed 8 offensive and 18 defensive caroms.

Eight different Norton players pulled down at least one rebound. The leader was Wahlmeier with 8, followed by Brooks, 7; Nickell, 5; Mc-Conney, 4; Ellis, 3; Dalton Miller, 2; Gilgenbach, 2; Hartwell, 1.

Wahlmeier blocked 1 shot.


Norton had 8 steals compared to 6 for Southwestern Heights. Nickell and McConney each had 3 thefts and Brooks had 2.

The Blue Jays were credited with 16 offensive assists while the Mustangs had just 9. Brooks led Norton in assists with 5, followed by Nickell, Hartwell, Wahlmeier, 3 each; Ellis, McKenna, 1 each.

Norton had 15 turnovers and Southwestern Heights lost the ball 17 times.

As a team, Norton hit 6 of 17 from beyond the arc for 35 percent, 11 of 32 two-point attempts for 34 percent and 17 of 49 overall for 35 percent.
