Information now available for consumers

Consumers now have convenient access to important nutritional information about the raw meat and poultry products they most frequently purchase, the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Food Safety and Inspection Service has announced. Under a new rule, packages of ground or chopped meat and poultry, such as hamburger or ground turkey, will now feature nutrition facts panels on their labels. Additionally, 40 of the most popular whole, raw cuts of meat and poultry, such as chicken breast or steak, will also have nutritional information either on the package labels or on display to consumers at the store.

The new nutrition facts panels will list the number of calories and the grams of total fat and saturated fat that a product contains. For example, consumers will be able to compare the calories and fat content for ground turkey versus ground beef, or for pork chops versus chicken breasts, right in the store. Additionally, a ground or chopped product that includes on its label a lean percentage statement, such as “85 percent lean,” and is not considered “low in fat” also will list its fat percentage, making it easier for consumers to understand the amounts of lean and fat content in a particular product. Consumers will no longer have to guess which products fit their diets.

Program sign-up is available

The Conservation Reserve Program is offering a general sign-up period from March 12 through April 6. The program has successfully protected our natural resources while providing economic and environmental benefits to rural communities for the past 25 years.

Landowners enrolled in the program receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource conserving covers on environmentally sensitive land. Land that is not currently enrolled in the program and land expiring Sept. 30 can be offered during signup if all eligibility requirements are met. Offers for contracts will be ranked according to the Environmental Benefits Index. Each eligible offer is ranked in comparison to all other offers and selections are made from the ranking. RESOLUTION NO. 117

A RESOLUTION DECLARING CERTAIN PROPERTIES TO BE UNSAFE AND DANGEROUS AND ORDERING THEIR REPAIR OR REMOVAL

WHEREAS, Ordinance #260, provides a procedure for ordering the repair or removal of dangerous structures; and,

WHEREAS, the enforcing officer has filed a statement with the governing body pursuant to Ordinance #260 declaring certain structures to be unsafe or dangerous; and,

WHEREAS, on March 5, 2012, the Norcatut City Council met and held a hearing after proper notice concerning making a determination of whether or not such structures were unsafe or dangerous.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORCATUT, KANSAS, that:

Section 1: After hearing testimony from Jan Ackerman, Code Enforcement Officer, the council finds that the property at 124 S. Decatur is unsafe and dangerous and orders the owner to repair or remove the structure not later than April 30, 2012. If, by April 30, 2012, the property is not repaired or removed, the city will proceed to remove the property.

Section 2: This resolution shall be published in the official city newspaper one time, and the enforcing officer shall mail by certified, restricted delivery mail, marked “deliver to addressee only” a copy of this resolution to each such owner, agent, lienholder or occupant of each of the structures described above.
