Program sign-up is available

The Conservation Reserve Program is offering a general sign-up period from March 12 through April 6. The program has successfully protected our natural resources while providing economic and environmental benefits to rural communities for the past 25 years.

Landowners enrolled in the program receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource conserving covers on environmentally sensitive land. Land that is not currently enrolled in the program and land

expiring Sept. 30 can be offered during signup if all eligibility requirements are met. Offers for contracts will be ranked according to the Environmental Benefits Index.
