Bassmaster magazine, the official publication for members of B.A.S.S., announced recently the 100 best bass fishing lakes in the country and Norton County’s own Sebelius Reservoir has been named to that list. The lake was named 87th on the list.

The list was compiled in a months-long process that included research from state fisheries agencies, nominations from B.A.S.S. Federation Nation tournament organizers and a panel of widely traveled professional anglers, fishing writers and others.
