Linner was born and raised in Norton County and, after high school, she attended Emporia State University and Fort Hays State Hays University where she studied business and accounting.

Wanda Vincent: Register of Deeds


Wanda Vincent was raised in Norton County, south of Lenora. She is a graduate of Lenora High School and, after high school, earned a bachelor's degree in business with a major in accounting from Fort Hays State University.

In 1992, Vincent was hired as a deputy in the Register of Deeds office. In 1996, she was elected as the county's Register of Deeds.

Vincent's education also includes a certification through Kansas State University and Register of Deeds Association in 2003. She has served as Secretary/Treasurer, Vice President and President of the Northwest District Register of Deeds Association. She has also served on the nominating committee for the State Register of Deeds Association.

The mission of the Register of Deeds is to preserve records, such as real estate transactions, for the future.

Robert Wyatt: County Clerk

Robert Wyatt is a life-long resident of Norton County and was raised on a farm in the northwest part of the county. He still farms in that area, along with operating three small businesses in the county.

Wyatt was elected to the position of County Clerk in 1996 and assumed responsibilities in 1997.

In 2003, he earned recognition as a Certified County Clerk through Wichita State University and he received a Master County Clerk certification through Wichita State University's Hugo Wall School in 2010. He also became a certified election officer in 2004.

Some of the duties of County Clerk include handling county accounts payable, running elections for the county, maintaining tax unit boundary certifications, preparing property abstracts, working with county entities to develop budgets and handling county insurance.

Robert Wyatt and his wife, Jane, have three children and two grandchildren.

Doug Sebelius: County Attorney

Having now served seven terms in the position, R. Douglas "Doug" Sebelius was elected as Norton County Attorney in 1980. He has also operated a private law practice in Norton since 1976.

As county attorney, his responsibilities include serving as chief law enforcement official and prosecutor and as legal advisor to the Norton County Commissioners and county departments.

"During my time in office, I have been responsible for handling several thousand cases before the district court, which range from serious felony offense to

traffic infractions," Sebelius said.

Sebelius is a life-long member of the Republican party and has served as chairman of the Norton County Republican Central Committee and as a state member of the Kansas Republican Party.

Troy Thomson: County Sheriff

Troy Thomson is a life-long resident of Norton County and has served as the Norton County Sheriff for the past 14 years. He has been employed with the Sheriff's Department for 19 years.

During his time as Sheriff, Thomson has helped implement the county's Total Notify system, which allows residents to receive emergency notifications electronically. In addition, the department has implemented phase three of the 911 system, which provides caller location.

Thomson said that every year, his department has been under budget and he intends to continue providing quality law enforcement service while maintaining fiscal responsibility for the citizens of Norton County.
