Barbara Jean Gilhousen

Barbara Jean Gilhousen, 93, passed from her earthly life on Nov. 6, 2012 in Overland Park. As she begins her new life, she is remembered for the full and active time she spent as a wife, mother, grandmother, greatgrandmother and member of her community.

Barbara was born in Grand Junction, Colo., the daughter of Mamie Carnine Marshall and adopted at a very early age by Dr. W. H. Marshall who loved and raised her as his own. She moved as a young girl to Norton, where she attended Norton schools until her junior year in high school when the family moved to Russell. She graduated from Russell High School in 1936, but also considered herself a part of the Norton Class of 1936 and attended the class reunions of both schools. While in Russell, she worked at Dawson Drug Store, where her two crowning achievements were training a young Bob Dole to work in the soda fountain and meeting Fred. L. Gilhousen. Barbara and Fred were married on June 2, 1937, and made their home in Russell until returning to Norton prior to Fred's enlistment to serve in World War II.

Barbara worked for many years as an executive secretary, first for Western Adjustment

Bureau, later as the first employee of Valley Hope where she served in many capacities for the first 10 years of Valley Hope's existence, and finally as church secretary of the Norton Methodist Church. She was also active in the community, proudly serving as a Red Cross Gray Lady, a Cub Scout leader, and as a member of the United Methodist Church. She later joined the Episcopal Church, where she was an eager participant at both Trinity Church, Norton, and Church of the Transfiguration, Logan.

Barbara was also an avid and accomplished bridge player, enjoying the company of many bridge partners in Norton and playing in duplicate bridge tournaments both nationally and internationally. She also had a thirst for knowledge and travel, which took her to many places throughout the world by air, land and sea. She was an amazing, quick-witted, sometimes feisty, and loving person who expressed those qualities in many facets of her life. She was also a caring person, especially toward her family and many friends, and expressed that caring capacity literally to the day of her death. As her health began to fail in her last two years of her life, she retained a love of

the life she had and was strong in her faith of the life that would follow. Her entry into Heaven has probably changed it for-

Barbara was preceded in death by her parents, a brother, and her husband of 45 years, Fred L. Gilhousen who died Dec. 12, 1982. She leaves three sons, Frederic and Carolyn of Lake Quivira; Dennis and Laura of Mission; and James of Wichita.
