The Norton County commissioners weren't expecting visitors on Monday as they had no one on their agenda.

However at the last minute, Norton Economic Development Director Scott Sproul and Norton Area Chamber of Commerce Director Tara Vance

dropped by to brief them on a few things happening in the community.

Mr. Sproul said that the streets are done in the Ryan Addition and that things are going well for the upcoming Governor's Pheasant Hunt, which Norton and Graham County are sponsoring.

Ms. Vance told the commissioners

how work is going on both the Lyons House and the Heaton Building.

In other business, the commissioners:

•Held a hearing on redemption of a temporary note which was used until bonds could be issued to pay for improvements to Road L. This is part of the county's economic development

help for the Ag Valley project.

•Agreed to continue as members of the e-waste coalition and pay the \$1,000 fee required. Trego, Graham, Ellis, Cloud, Rooks, Phillips, Osborne, Republic and Lincoln counties are also part of the coalition, which deals with getting rid of old electronic equipment.

School board looks at some changes for new year

mstephens@nwkansas.com The Board of Education, U.S.D. 211, held eight closed door sessions, lasting nearly two hours, at its Monday meeting to discuss a complicated personnel matter, according to Superintendent Greg Mann. The board utilizes closed door sessions for the purpose of discussing matters relating to non-elected personnel, and in this case, according to Mann, required the presence of the board's attorney because of the numerous angles that needed to be examined, which raised more questions by the

board. However, no action was taken by the board as a result of the closed sessions.

In other business, the board approved two evaluation systems for teachers in U.S.D. 211 for the 2013-14 school year. The Kansas Educators Evaluation Protocol or KEEP system will be used for special education staff and selected teachers, and the current U.S.D. 211 evaluation tool will be used for all others who are up for evaluation.

The board also revised the U.S.D. 211 evaluation tool, with input from the Norton Teacher's Association and U.S.D. 211 professional staff, in order

to meet the Kansas State Department at the October meeting. of Education requirements and submit it to the Department for consideration for the 2014-15 school year.

In other board news:

-the facility steering committee will be Monday, Sept. 16 at 7 p.m., in the high school/junior high library.

-board member Robert Wyatt was appointed delegate to the Kansas Association of School Boards convention to be held Dec. 6-8, in Wichita.

-Trudy Stockham, Language Arts Chairperson, presented to the board a revised language arts curriculum, which will be considered for adoption

-approved the 2013-14 activity guidelines and regulations as presented.

-approved the work agreement with Devon Oeijdad as the Thursday evening weight room supervisor.

-accepted the consent agenda which included the agenda for Sept. 9, the minutes of the regular meeting on Aug. 19, and approval of bills as presented.

-approved the minutes of the Profession Development Committee Council for Aug. 26.
