Kristine Knapp and Tonya Stover attended a trail seminar held by the Sunflower Foundation, which has grant money available specifically for the purpose of installing community running trails.

Knapp said this venture is in

the planning stages and that she and Stover are looking for public input to see if there is enough interest from the community to pursue a grant, and if so, who would utilize it and where best to put it.

"People are interested in community amenities and a running trail would promote healthy, family-oriented activities," said Knapp.

The entire process could take up to a year, according to Knapp.

"We need a plan, community

input, then we need to get bids from local contractors, and then we can apply to the foundation."

The Foundation requires three things, matching funds, in-kind contributions and a community fundraiser, which would show the community's support for the endeavor.
