associated detours, as well as share information regarding two bridge replacement projects in Norton County.

The first bridge is located approximately 11.5 miles east of the Norton/Decatur County line on K-9 Highway (between Lenora and the U.S. 283 junction), over the North Fork Solomon River Drainage. The second bridge project is located less than a mile east of the K-9/K-173 junction (between Edscheduling of construction and mond and Logan) on K-9 High-

way, over Big Timber Creek. The bridge projects are funded by T-WORKS, the Transportation program passed by the Kansas Legislature in May of 2010; and designed to create jobs, preserve highway infrastructure, and spur economic development opportunities across the state.
