### Drug take-back was a success

Kansans turned in nearly 5 tons of medications during last weekend's National Drug Take-Back Day, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt said today.

Local law enforcement officials collected 9,777 pounds of medications at 104 locations across the state.

In Norton, Sheriff Troy Thomson said, "we had a great turnout," as his office took in nearly 75 pounds worth of unused prescription drugs. "Most of the people don't know how to get rid of unused prescription drugs, but the message is getting out there, more and more," said Thomson.

The semi-annual event was sponsored nationwide by the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, which collects and safely destroys the mediever collected in Kansas during a take-back day. More than 22 tons of medications have been collected in Kansas since the program began in

"Safely disposing of these medications means that they are no longer susceptible to accidental or intentional misuse," Schmidt said. "Kansans clearly recognize the importance of making sure these medications don't fall into the wrong hands."

Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are increasing, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show a

cations. This was the highest amount majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that traditional methods for disposing of unused medicines - flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash – pose potential safety and health hazards and should be avoided.

Unused prescriptions can be turned in year-round at many local law enforcement locations. Kansans should contact their local sheriff's office or police department for more informa-

### **Pheasants Forever Banquet** on Friday

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The Norton Long Spur Pheasants Forever Chapter will be hosting its banquet this Friday. It is their sole fundraiser and membership drive event for the year. It will be held on Friday, Nov. 8 at the Norton Eagles Club, with the social hour starting at 5:30 p.m., supper at 7 p.m. and the auction starting at 7 p.m.

There are 300 tickets available for this event at the cost of \$35 each so be sure to get yours early or hope they have some left at the door. There will be raffles, tickets sales, a live auction and the kids auction at the event. A total of 24 guns will be given away along with a great meal and good times. All of the proceeds stay in the chapter locally for local habitat and youth expenditures.

Brock Miller is the president of the not for profit chapter and he along with 30 board members and hundreds of members provide activities all year long for the youth of the area and help with habitat projects. The board members are not paid, they are all volunteers. "A lot is done behind the scenes that no one ever sees or knows about and it is thanks to these volunteers that we even have a chapter in Norton. I can't thank them enough," Miller said.

The youth coordinator for the chapter is Jeremiah Stark and both he and Miller work together to come up with new ideas each year to keep kids outdoors and pheasants on the ground. The chapter, in partnership with the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and Tourism, host many events. They put on a youth hunt at Prairie Dog State Park each year allowing youth to hunt ground that is only open to them and only them once a year. They also hold youth trap shoots, sponsor OK Kids Day and this year offered and introduction to hunting waterfowl. They put on six hunts throughout the year, some for pheasants and others for duck and goose hunting.

Not only does the chapter work on getting the youth involved but they work to improve the habitat for wildlife in the area. These habitat projects help farmers set up ecosystems for pheasants and other birds to insure a good hatch. The Long Spur Chapter lines farmers up with farm bill wildlife biologists to determine what grasses and flowers will best support the current wildlife in the area and to insure that it will flourish and not parish.

The Norton Long Spur Pheasants Forever Chapter does so much for this area. They don't just have one big party a year but are very eco and youth minded all year long. Miller concluded by saying, "Our kids are the future of the outdoors and of outdoor sportsmen." So come out and support the chapter, our area youth and the land we live in along with the wildlife we share it with.

### **Teen dies** in rollover

At 7:56 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 3 a 1996 Dodge Ram pickup, driven by fifteen year old Eli T. Lowry of Prairie View, rolled on county road W 1300 and Sante Fe, or six miles south of Highway 36 on W 1300.

Eli is the son of Calvin and Emily Lowry. He was driving north on road W 1300 and was unable to negotiate the curve and lost control. The pickup entered the north ditch causing the pickup to roll and it came to rest facing east. Lowry was not wearing a seatbelt.

Lowry was transported to the Phillips County hospital where he passed

away.
