Agency resumes crop loans

U.S Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan Garcia announced recently that the processing and disbursement of 2013 crop commodity loans has resumed. The commodity loan programs provide interim financing to producers for agricultural commodities stored after harvest and then sold throughout the year. Crop year 2013 commodity loan-making was suspended Oct. 1, 2013, to make changes necessary to accommodate the automatic funding reductions known as sequester. Sequestration is man-

dated by the Budget Control Act of 2011.

We must comply with the laws established by Congress in accordance with sequestration policy," said Garcia. "We regret the delay this has created in USDA issuing marketing assistance loans because we know how critical the loans are to farmers' cash flows at this time of year."

Producers requesting 2013 crop commodity loans on their harvested commodities will have a 5.1 percent reduction to the loan amount upon its disbursement, due to the sequestration. Commodity loans issued by marketing associations and loan servicing agents are also subject to the sequestration reduction.

During the period that loanmaking was suspended, producers were still able to submit loan applications to their county FSA offices, marketing associations and loan servicing agents.

It was formerly owned and used by Bill Shimmick and has been donated by his family to the museum. Sixty two guests signed the register, most of whom were from this northwest KS area. Out of state guests were from Iowa.

The potluck supper, held in the Sunflower Senior Center. showcased some of the favorite foods of the Czech immigrants who settled in the Jennings area - roast pork, sauerkraut and potato dumplings, and kolaches. Approximately 100 guests from Colorado, Nebraska, Oklahoma

and northwest Kansas gathered to enjoy the meal.

The evening concluded with a dance by John Fritzler and his polka band from Colorado. The dance was well attended with polka dancers from the surrounding states as well as from many towns of the northwest KS area. Towns represented included Oakley, Hays, Oberlin, Hoxie, Colby, and Levant. Dancers and bystanders, both young and old, enjoyed the excellent music the band produced with the dulcimer, keyboard, accordion, trombone and saxophone.

early twentieth centuries, the Colonial Revival romanticized colonial life and idealized the domestic sphere. It is no surprise, then, that the Colonial Revival sparked renewed interest in making needlework items that had been popular in previous generations such as crossstitch samplers, hooked rugs and quilts. Textiles traditionally have been closely connected to women's lives, and quilting, in particular, allowed women to believe they were participating in a needle art practiced by their colonial grandmothers. By making quilts like those their foremothers supposedly had made, women felt that they were participating not only in tradition, but in history itself.

Colonial Revival quilts reflect the complexity of the movement itself. They may be pieced, re-
