Council gets reports and fills vacancy

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The Planning Commission board vacancy was filled at the City Council's Wednesday, Dec. 18 meeting. Mayor David Corns said that two names were submitted and the council approved the mayor's appointment of Bill Vacura to fill the vacant position on the Planning Commission, with the term expiring on Nov. 30, 2016.

Council member Roberta Ryan reported that the City of Beloit had removed the parts from the power plant and paid the City of Norton. Ryan said the City of Beloit might come back after the first of the year to determine if there are any more items they might want to purchase.

Ryan also reported that a prison crew refurbished Santa's sleigh, "and it looks really nice," and that approximately 250 people attended the free

movie for the Chamber of Commerce's Christmas promotion. The Chamber board is making preparations for the 2014 annual Chamber banquet, including menu and program.

Council member Harriett Gill reported that the Airport Board will have an independent cost analysis done, which is required by the Federal Aviation Administration for grant funding. A special Airport Board meeting was held on December 23.

Council member Donna Foley reported the Public Works committee discussed the bowling family fun center, which she said is progressing. The Economic Board will also be pursuing a Kansas Department of Transportation enhancement grant for the downtown area, and will come before the council for approval, the second meeting in January. 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Colby native steps down from position

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Sheila Sloan Frahm, a Colby native and long-time public servant, marked the end of her weekly or monthly travels to Topeka this month.

She stepped down from her position on the Kansas State Postsecondary Technical Education Authority this month.

The end of her term concludes a public service career that began in 1978 when she won a spot on the Colby

School Board.

Frahm, born into a family that had farmed in Thomas County for generations, graduated from Colby High School in 1963. She attended Fort Hays State University, graduating in 1967, and the University of Texas at Austin before returning to Colby in 1976 after her father-in-law, Albert Frahm, died and she and her husband Ken returned to the family farm.

She ran for the school board position when the family first moved back to

Colby, having two young daughters at the time. She won the primary but lost the general election.

Two years later, she ran again and won, holding her position on the board until 1985.

Frahm said she enjoyed the opportunities for interacting with the community while she was on the school board. She began traveling to Topeka as the board's representative to the Kansas Association of School Boards.

In 1985, she was appointed to the

state Board of Education, winning an election to the board in 1986 and serving as the vice-chairman in 1987. She represented 34 Kansas counties.

In 1988, she was elected to the Kansas Senate for the 40th District, winning re-election in 1992.

Frahm said she remembers going to towns throughout northwest Kansas, knocking on doors, trying to earn votes by talking to each constituent. Some

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Semi was destroyed in Jennings fire last week



A semi-trailer rig driven by an Illinois man caught fire last Wednesday afternoon as the driver was passing through Jennings, destroying the tractor, sleeper cab and most of the driver's worldly goods.

Joseph McCoy of Centralia, Ill., said he was traveling east on K-383 when he smelled smoke in the cab about 3 p.m. As he turned into the Jennings City Park, he said, the right front tire of the tractor blew out. The noise alerted Paul and Kathy Nauer, who live across the street, and they called the Jennings Fire Department.

Mr. McCoy said he got out of the cab and tried to subdue the flames shooting from under the hood with a fire extinguisher. The sleeper cab and engine compartment were fully engulfed when firemen arrived.

The blaze took about 15 minutes to get under control, said Jennings Fire Chief Kerry Green. While the tractor was a total loss, firefighters were able to keep the blaze away from the trailer and its cargo.

"Almost everything I had was in that truck," said Mr. McCoy, including clothes and a laptop computer, "but I feel blessed that I wasn't injured."

Mr. McCoy said he had been on the road since October. He praised the fire department's quick response.
