Kansas Counties designated as primary natural disaster areas

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated 37 counties in Kansas as primary natural disaster areas due to a recent drought.

Those counties are:

Chevenne, Graham, Lane, Phillips, Sherman, Clark, Grant, Logan, Rawlins, Stanton, Comanche, Gray, Meade, Rooks, Stevens, Decatur, Greeley, Morton, Rush, Thomas, Ellis, Hamilton, Ness, Scott, Trego, Finney, Haskell, Norton, Seward, Wallace, Ford, Hodgeman, Pawnee, Sheridan, Wichita, Gove and Kearny

All counties listed above were designated natural disaster areas on Jan. 15, 2014, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency, provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. The Farm Service Agency will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. The agency has a variety of programs, in addition to the emergency loan program, to help eligible farmers recover from adversity.

The Obama Administration remains committed to helping the thousands of farm families and businesses struggling with natural disasters. Actions taken by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack in 2012 to provide assistance to producers impacted by the drought included:

Extended emergency grazing on Conservation Reserve Program acres, freeing up a record 2.8 million acres and as much as \$200 million in forage and feed for ranchers during a challenging time. Purchased \$170 million of pork, lamb, chicken, and catfish for federal food nutrition assistance programs, including food banks, to help relieve pressure on American livestock producers and bring the nation's meat supply in line with demand. Reduced the emergency loan rate, from 3.75 percent to 2.875 percent, as well as making emergency loans available earlier in the season. Hays to experience fake ID crackdown

Using a fake ID to get into bars or purchase alcohol will be a lot more difficult now, thanks to a campaign known as "Fake ID 101.'

On Jan. 14, local police officers underwent training on campus at Fort Hays State University in order to better prepare themselves for this initiative. The training included lectures over fake IDs, features on the most recent driver's license designs, conducting liquor control buys, drug recognition and from a family member or friend, trends, cell phone searches, and basic narcotic investigations. Mike Baker, president of the Kansas Association of Chiefs of Police, and Doyle King, executive director, also delivered presentations.

is set to run through June 2014 and is sponsored by Everyday Prevention Impacting Community Coalition of Ellis County, the Regional Prevention Center, the Kansas Traffic Safety Resource Office, Alcoholic Beverage Control, the Hays police department and FHSU campus police.

"Fake ID 101" was created to discourage the use of fake IDs within the community. False identification is an ID borrowed an ID altered in any way or an ID containing completely falsified information. The consequences for use or possession of a fake ID are a fine of up to \$2,500 and up to a year in jail.

from Hays police, FHSU campus police and Alcoholic Beverage Control will perform compliance and bar checks. Along with those checks, surveillance operations will occur in bars and other liquor establishments as well as during community events to hinder minors' access to alcohol.

An advertising campaign for the "Fake ID 101" initiative is in the works for television, radio, billboards and websites in the community and on the FHSU campus. Display boards will be featured inside bars popular within the high school and college-age demographic, and posters will be noticeable inside additional bars, restaurants and other places where liquor is served.


When medical marijuana is purchased and the sales tax associated with recreational use marijuana is not paid, and the marijuana is brought into Kansas to be resold, the person has committed a tax evasion crime as well as distribution crimes.

I do not believe the new law concerning recreational marijuana will not have a large scale effect on Cheyenne County. As of now, a non-resident can only purchase a small amount of marijuana at each transaction. This makes the process of completing enough transactions to justify the trip to Colorado difficult. Add in the fact, recreational marijuana carries a high tax, and it becomes hard for someone to go to Denver, purchase marijuana and return to Kansas to resell. As with any business, if the profit margin does not ex-

I am also prepared to continue working with Colorado authorities and monitoring the locations of distribution points.

While marijuana is legal in Colorado, it remains illegal to grow, possess, distribute or drive under the influence of marijuana in Cheyenne County, he concluded.
