Agrees to acquire Norton Bank

City Council praises Norton wrestlers

The Norton City Council congratulated the Norton Community High School wrestling team for their 2014 State Championship title at its Wednesday meeting.

Norton Wrestling Club President Jamie Amlong gave the council an update on the mats being purchased for the Wrestling Club. Amlong said the mats are being purchased and the Wrestling Club will be paying half of the costs now, and will pay the balance when the mats are completed. The mats are custom made, according to Amlong, and

should be finished three to four months from the order date. Amlong stated he would keep the council updated re-

garding the status of the mats. Andrew Bashford, an Eagle Scout and a member of Troop 123 of Phillipsburg, told the council that he is looking for an Eagle Scout project to complete by the end of the school year. He said he would like to give a fresh coat of paint to the red posts around the Veteran's Memorial Park and put in benches, and possibly make other improvements. The council directed him to contact Gary and Carol Erlenbusch regarding any projects at Veteran's Memorial Park, and for Bashford to bring his final plan back to the council.

The routing of the grain trucks from the scales to the dump site for Ag Valley was discussed by the Public Works Committee, according to Donna Foley, and a representative from Ag Valley will be invited to the next Public Works committee meeting. Foley also said Public Works received a request from Valley Hope to remove the concrete after the old bowling alley building is removed, but the committee does not feel the city should have to do this, and will recommend Valley Hope contact the County or a prison crew.

Ron Briery reported that Goodwill has requested to bring a semi-truck to Norton for donations, and it was discussed doing this in the City parking lot behind Moffet Drug. The council voted in favor of the donation truck and the date will be determined at a future council meeting.

In other council news:

-Roberta Ryan reported the city general sales tax receipts collected in January of 2014 totaled \$18,641.57, the city pool sales tax receipts totaled \$27,962.36, and the county sales tax receipts totaled \$13,810.53 for a total of

hires new Physical Therapist

Norton County Hospital continues to make improvements to provide greater health care access for the community. The hospital has hired a full-time registered physical therapist. Kellen Jacobs is a doctor of physical therapy and began his tenure as Director of Rehabilitation on Jan. 13.

Prior to Jacobs arrival, the physical therapist position was only two days a week and only five hours per day, limiting the number of patients that could

be seen. "Having myself here five days a week means there is a lot more access

to physical therapy," said Jacobs. Besides Jacobs, the hospital has three physical therapy assistants, Jan Volgamore, Reesa Volgamore and Valerie Elliott. The physical therapy department sees 20 to 30 patients a day, according to Jacobs.

"We keep busy, more than in the past, because there is greater access and availability," Jacobs said. "More availability means less wait."

The department has a lot of irons in the fire, according to Jacobs, and more changes are in store. Norton County Hospital is considering hiring an occupational therapist, which Jacobs said the hospital hasn't had in a while.

He also wants to work with the local schools and their athletic programs.

"I'm very interested in working
