Deadline extended for Initiative

State Conservationist Eric B. Banks for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced the extension of the cutoff date to April 18, 2014, for the Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI). Even though Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative is no longer a program under the 2014 Farm Bill, Natural Resources Conservation Service will honor existing Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative agreements through fiscal year 2014. The Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative provides financial and technical assistance through the Environmen-

tal Quality Incentives Program to owners and operators of agricultural land and nonindustrial private forestlands.

This year, the program is funded for shelterbelt renovation and forested riparian buffers. "For farmers and ranchers that need to restore a shelterbelt or want to plant riparian forest buffers, Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative can provide financial assistance to help with the project," said Banks.

In Kansas, socially disadvantaged, limited resource, and beginning farmers and ranchers will receive a higher payment rate for conservation practices related to Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative.
