Competition was tough for Lady Jay roundballers

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Second year head coach George Rossi's 2013-14 Norton Community High School girls basketball team had only two returning starters and that limited their chances in this part of the state where there are a number of state ranked teams every year.

The Lady Jays battled hard all season and had a number of losses where they played well for a half or three quarters but couldn't quite put a whole game together. The result was a season record of 8-13 after losing their final five games.

"This was a fun group of girls," said coach Rossi. "They worked hard and are great girls. Our five seniors will be missed. These girls gave it their all the entire season. The younger girls did a good job as well. Many thanks to everyone who supported us this year."

Coach Rossi also noted that the five seniors, Bailey Ambrosier, Katelyn Engelbert, both of whom were returning starters, Darcy Bainter, Johnnye Ruder and Marisa Maddy were all chosen as Academic All-State by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association.

There were eight returning letter winners on the team. In addition to the five seniors, they were junior Katie Bohl and sophomores Peyton Renner and Hanna Brooks.

Assistant coaches again this season were Joan Bolt and Cheri Brooks. Raenee Patterson returned as a student manager and was joined by Dakota Rose in that position.

The Lady Jays opened the season in Goodland on Friday, Dec. 6. Norton kept up with Goodland in the first half and trailed by one point 18-17 at intermission. A six-point third quarter was not enough and the Lady Cowgirls won 42-25. Freshman Caitlyn Cox was high scorer with 6 points.

"I was concerned by the possibility of turnovers in this first game; unfortunately, my fears came true," said coach Rossi.

Norton became more familiar with the road to Goodland the next weekend when the Lady Jays competed in the annual Topside Tip-Off Tournament. On Thursday, Norton lost 59-47 to Sharon Springs. Norton led 38-31 after three quarters but hit only two field goals in the final stanza. Ruder led scoring with 12 points.

On Friday, Norton played Burlington, Colo. and won 41-35. It was 18-all at halftime but Norton led 27-22 after three periods. Norton had balanced scoring

with Bohl hitting 12 points, followed by Ruder, 9; Ambrosier, 8. "It was a great feeling getting that first win under our belts," commented coach Rossi.

In Saturday's consolation bracket, the Lady Jays felt good again when they defeated Wray, Colo. 56-53 in overtime to place fifth in the tournament. It was a close game throughout with Norton trailing 22-23 at halftime and leading 36-35 after three quarters. With ice water in her veins, Bainter hit two free throws with 13 seconds left in regulation to tie the game at 49all and send it into overtime.

"It was a fantastic win with many big moments," said coach Rossi. Bainter and Bohl each hit 17 points.

The Lady Jays returned home on Tuesday, Dec. 17, hosted Stockton and treated the hometown fans to their third straight victory. Four different Lady Jays buried three-point shots in a 58-21 Mid-Continent League victory! Ruder hit 5 of 10 treys for 15 points; Bainter swished 4 of 5 from long range for 12 points; freshman Miah Melvin hit 2 of 4 from downtown and freshman Baylee Miller also swished a trey.

"We shot great and played good defense and our bench 7 points. also did a great job," said coach

The competition got tougher again on Friday, Dec. 20 when Norton traveled to Phillipsburg to play the Lady Panthers. Norton played well and trailed by just 10 points at halftime before Lady Jays outscored the Lady outscoring Phillipsburg in the Cardinals 15-6 in the final stansecond half. The Lady Panthers survived with a 46-40 win. Ruder scored 16 points and Bainter added 12. "I was proud of how we hung in and fought back," said coach Rossi as Norton's record evened at 3-3.

Bohl was the leading rebounder for Norton, pulling down a total of 127 caroms, followed by Bailey Ambrosier, 97, Engelbert, 89; Caitlyn Cox, 79 and Bainter, 62.
