BB Gun team competes at Legion shoot

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Having already qualified for the national shoot, the Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team competed in the American Legion State Shoot in Alma on Saturday to gain experience.

The Norton County team placed fourth in the Legion Shoot but had already qualified for the Daisy National BB Gun Championships during the State 4-H Shooting Match, also held earlier in Alma.

Johnson County won the Legion championship with a team score of 2263-44, followed by Wabaunsee No.1, 2229-50; Riley/Potawatomie, 2201-54; Norton County, 2177-30 and Reno County, 2082-29.

Norton's top shooter was Stacie Elliott, who placed fifth individually among all shooters and was third best marksman from standing. Her scores were: 92-4, prone; 91-2, standing; 91-1, sitting; 90-2, kneeling, 98, test score; 462-9 total score.

Norton's Scott Sansom was ninth best shooter individually. His scores were: 89-3, prone; 84-0, standing; 92-4, sitting; 89-2, kneeling; 96, test score; 450-9 total score.

The Blue Jays' Miles Harrington was their third highest scorer and was 12th overall. His scores were: 92-1, prone; 85-2, standing; 91-1, sitting; 90-2, kneeling; 90, test score; 448-6 total score.

Fourth best shooter for Norton and ranking 27th individually was Lily David. Her scores were 85-1, prone; 86-2, standing; 90-2, sitting; 78-0, kneeling; 90, test score; 429-5, total score.

Completing the Norton team's shooting was Althea Paxton, who ranked 36th among all shooters. Her scores were: 84-0, prone; 69-0, standing; 76-0, sitting; 77-1, kneeling; 82, test score; 388-

"Our marksmen got more shooting experience in this shoot as well as getting to take a written test once again," said Norton head coach Jeff Elliott.

"I had a scheduling conflict so Marty Harrington was willing to step in and become our head coach for the day. Our guns performed well again and

John Baker is to be thanked for this. He has been good at keeping our guns functional.

"Also, thanks to classroom instructor Valerie Elliott and Rod Sansom for assisting Marty Harrington on the line.

"With our tournaments behind us, we will now focus on the national shoot. We will have five shooters and two alternates practicing and plan to now practice twice weekly.

"We will work on our marksmen becoming more precise in their shooting. We will also focus on the written test of gun safety, which is one fifth of the score."

"Our young people did quite well on Saturday," said Harrington. "Since we'd already qualified for the national, I just let them shoot to enjoy shooting without any pressure.

"It's a long season and we appreciate not only the time our shooters spend but also our parents and other adults who give of their time to the program."

Coach Elliott said the team will conduct some fund-raising endeavors in the future to raise money for the trip to the national shoot.

The Daisy National BB Gun Championships will be held July 4-5-6 in the John Q. Hammons Convention Center in Rogers, Ark., the home of Daisy.

The national shoot is the largest junior marksmanship competition in the world.

After missing last year's national shoot, Norton will shoot in the national competition for the 44th year in what will be the 49th national shoot.

It was originally the international shoot and a Norton County team has won the championship eight times, more than any other team in the country.
