Freezing food is easy and convenient

Freezing food is easy and convenient. Using proper preparation methods for freezing the foods can result in high quality, nutritious foods.

Vegetables must be water or steam blanched to stop enzymes in the food from changing texture, flavor, color and nutrition. Blanching also helps kill bacteria. Check recommended freezing resources to find out how long to blanch as each vegetable's blanching time may be different.

Fruits also contain enzymes that cause browning and vitamin C loss. Ascorbic acid is an effective treatment to stop enzymes changes in fruit related to browning.

Because fruits and vegetables are over 90 percent water, freezing will cause cell walls holding

batches for faster freezing.

One point which is often overlooked is the need to use food grade plastic freezing materials. Make sure that any plastic bags or containers in which foods are frozen are labeled freezer bags or containers. Using non-food grade plastics whether plastic bags or non-food grade plastic containers can cause illness because chemicals from non-food grade plastics can move into foods and could be harmful to anyone eating foods frozen improperly.

the water to break. This results in softer produce when thawed. Serving frozen produce partially thawed can reduce this liquid loss.

Freeze foods quickly for better quality. Set freezer temperature to the lowest setting. Use a freezer thermometer to monitor the temperature. After foods are frozen solid, you may need to adjust the temperature so that the temperature returns to 0 degrees F. Freeze foods in small
