Mrs. Roelfs has contacted area stores carrying Peter Pan peanut butter or Great Value peanut butter to take jars off the shelf with the number "2111" stamped on the lid.

The Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers not to eat these brands of peanut butter with the 2111 number on the lid because of the risk of contamination with "Salmonella Tennessee," a bacterium that causes foodborne illness.

Both the Peter Pan and Great Value brands are manufactured in a single facility in Georgia by ConAgra. Great Value peanut butter made by other manufacturers is not affected.

If consumers have any of this Peter Pan or Great Value brand peanut butter in their home that has been purchased since May 2006, they should discard it.

Symptoms of foodborne illness caused by Salmonella include fever, diarrhea and abdominal cramps. In people with poor underlying health or weakened immune systems, Salmonella can invade the bloodstream and cause life-threatening infections.

Individuals who have recently eaten Peter Pan and Great Value brand peanut butter beginning with product code 2111 and have experienced any of these symptoms should contact their doctor or health
