Jan. 31, 2007.

Preceding him in death were his
parents, Harry and Esther Archer,
several aunts, uncles and cousins.

Ross is survived by his brother,
Arlie and wife, Delores; nephew,
Alan Archer of McDonald; nieces,
Diana June Archer of Colorado
Springs and Joyce Ann McDaniel
and husband, Billy of Valley Cen-
ter; great-nephew, Tristan Archer
of McDonald-St. Francis; great
nieces, Megan Cram of Los Ange-
les, Calif., and Faith Ann McDaniel
of Valley Center; several cousins
and a host of friends, who will
greatly miss him.

He attended school at McDonald
and graduated from McDonald Ru-
ral High School in 1951. Ross at-
tended Kansas State at Manhattan
where he took agricultural engi-

neering. He then returned to the
farm where he farmed with his fa-
ther and brother Arlie.

In 1967, he started driving a truck
for Archer Farms, Inc., hauling
grain, cattle and produce for the
next 23 years.

He was a member of the
McDonald Federated Church, a
member of the Masonic Lodge 383
of which he was a Past Master of
McDonald and also a member of
Progressive Chapter 396 Order of
Eastern Star and then transferred to
St. Francis Lodge and Eastern Star
404 of which he received 50-year
memberships in 2005.

Ross always enjoyed the
McDonald Alumni school gather-
ings during Memorial weekend
where he visited classmates and
other friends.

He also enjoyed taking several
trips that included Cuba-Panama
Canal and two trips to Hawaii. As
time went on his traveling ceased
due to bad health.

Velma Althea Hilty
Oct. 10, 1919 - Feb. 12, 2007

Velma Althea Holl was born Oct.
10, 1919, on a farm northwest of
Bird City, Kan., to George and
Althea Holl. She died Feb. 12, 2007,
at the Cheyenne County Hospital,
St. Francis, at the age of 87.

Velma was baptized as a young
child and on May 17, 1936, she was
confirmed and continued her mem-
bership in the St. John Lutheran
Church.

Velma was united in marriage to
Carl Leroy Hilty on Aug. 18, 1941,
at Bird City. To this union two chil-

dren were born.

They lived on a farm northeast of
Bird City until 1965 when they
moved to town. Velma lived in Bird
City until December, 2006, when
she moved to St. Francis. She was a
homemaker.

Surviving her are daughter, Carol
and husband, Don of St. Francis;
son, James of Navarre; grandsons,
Ryan, Darron, Matthew; grand-
daughter, Krista; seven great-
grandchildren, and sister, Fleda
Raile.

Wesleyan Community Church in
Bird City on Feb. 16 with Pastor
Scott Baker and Pastor Dan Carson
officiating.

Some peanut butter is contaminated

Susan Roelfs, county health
nurse, said there has been one sus-
pected case and possibly another
reported in Cheyenne County. People
became sick after eating peanut
butter and the tests have been
sent in to make sure.

Mrs. Roelfs has contacted area
stores carrying Peter Pan peanut
butter or Great Value peanut butter
to take jars off the shelf with the
number "2111" stamped on the lid.

The Food and Drug Administra-
tion is warning consumers not to eat
these brands of peanut butter with
the 2111 number on the lid because
of the risk of contamination with
"Salmonella Tennessee," a bacte-
rium that causes foodborne illness.

Both the Peter Pan and Great
Value brands are manufactured in
a single facility in Georgia by
ConAgra. Great Value peanut but-
ter made by other manufacturers is
not affected.

If consumers have any of this
Peter Pan or Great Value brand pean-
ut butter in their home that has
been purchased since May 2006,
they should discard it.

Symptoms of foodborne illness
caused by Salmonella include fever,
diarrhea and abdominal
cramps. In people with poor under-
lying health or weakened immune
systems, Salmonella can invade the
bloodstream and cause life-threat-
ening infections.

Individuals who have recently
eaten Peter Pan and Great Value
brand peanut butter beginning with
product code 2111 and have experi-
enced any of these symptoms
should contact their doctor or health
care provider immediately. Any

such illnesses should be reported to
state or local health authorities.

The Federal Department of
Agriculture's warning is based on
a just-completed epidemiological
study by the Centers for Disease
Control and Prevention (CDC), the
states and local health agencies,
which links 288 cases of foodborne
illness in 39 states to consumption
of varying types of Peter Pan pean-
ut butter. This report was provided
to Federal Department of Agricul-
ture on Feb. 13.

The outbreak appears to be ongo-

ing and the first consumer may have
become ill in August 2006.

The cause of foodborne illnesses
can be difficult to identify. As a re-
sult of extensive epidemiological
testing and recent case control stud-
ies, Centers for Disease Control and
Prevention was recently able to
identify Peter Pan peanut butter as
the likely cause of illness. Great
Value brand peanut butter begin-
ning with product code 2111 is
manufactured in the same plant as
Peter Pan peanut butter and, thus, is
believed to be at similar risk of con-

tamination.

ConAgra is recalling all Peter Pan
and Great Value peanut butter be-
ginning with product code 2111 that
already was distributed. The com-
pany also is destroying all affected
products in their possession. The
company will cease production un-
til the exact cause of contamination
can be identified and eliminated.

Society offers a history scholarship

The Cheyenne County Historical
Society voted to offer a \$250 schol-
arship to one graduating senior in
order to encourage his or her further
education and interest in local his-
tory.

Applications must meet four cri-
teria: be a Cheyenne County resi-
dent; have a cumulative grade point
average of at least 2.0 at high school
graduation; be going on to a college,
university or vocation-technical
school; and submit an application
and essay in a large, brown envel-
ope by April 10 to Ward Cassidy
at St. Francis Community High
School or Anita Burton at Cheylin
High School.

Application forms are available
from Mr. Cassidy or Mrs. Burton.
St. Francis students should be aware
that the common application form
they usually complete for local
scholarships will not be used by the
Historical Society's Scholarship
Committee because they chose to

use a form that would be the same
for both St. Francis and Bird City
students.

An essay of 250-300 words
should address why it is important
to know the history of Cheyenne
County. The applicant should not
put his or her name on the essay it-
self because the judges wish to be
impartial.

The scholarship recipient will be

awarded \$125 on Aug. 15 and \$125
on Jan. 15, 2008, as long as he or she
maintains at least a 2.0 and remains
in good standing at the school at-
tended. This \$250 scholarship can
be used to help buy some texts or
pay some tuition or room and board.
