St. Francis man helps with cleanup

karenk@nwkansas.com On May 4, a tornado ripped through the middle of Kansas, destroying 95 percent of Greensburg.

Derrick Tice, St. Francis, and Mike Batten, Colby, were friends of Andy Burr whose parents lived in the destroyed town. Mr. Burr was a college buddy of the two men.

On Wednesday, May 9, they traveled to Greensburg to help Gary and Martha Burr sort through the rubble and carried load after load to the curb where it would be taken away.

Mr. Tice said they sat in line for 1.5 hours waiting to enter the town. If the windshield of the vehicle didn't have permission written on it with grease paint, the driver needed to have proof of why they were wanting to enter.

Mr. Tice said security was especially tight that day because President Bush was coming to see the damage. Later, the area was declared a federal disaster area.

The men found the Burr house completely destroyed. The car, while it ran, was almost completely destroyed and the pickup was totaled. Pictures Mr. Tice took showed houses and businesses in piles, pieces of tin wrapped around tree trunks which had most of the branches removed, the school and hospital were destroyed, and the roofs of the buildings housing emergency equipment had fallen on the fire trucks and ambulance.

"It was really terrible," Mr. Tice

They had arrived at 11:30 a.m. but were required to be out of town by 6 that evening. He said it was hard to get rid of much of the stuff in that short of time. He also noted that what the area needs is large equipment to move the
