# Boys basketball team plays make-up games

What a busy week. Two make-up games and a regular season contest had the Indians playing on Monday and Tuesday at home and Friday on the road.

The Monday night game was a make-up game with Wallace County/Sharon Springs. This game had fans on their feet with excitement but the Wildcats pulled out a 60-56 victory in a non-league contest.

Tuesday night things turned around and Sainty scored a 58-47 win over Triplains/Btewster.

Friday in the final Northwest Kansas League contest, Sainty met a strong Quinter Bulldog team and lost 77-41. The Bulldogs finished the regular season with a 17-3 record.

#### **Vs Wallace County**

This was an exciting game throughout as the lead began changing back-and-forth in the first quarter. The Indians went ahead at one point in the middle of the quarter and then with a last second shot had the advantage 14-12.

The second quarter belonged to the Wildcats as they moved in front midway through the period and used three-pointers to gain a 38-30 advantage by half time.

The Indians moved back to within two points during the third quarter but by the end of the period Wallace County was up 52-43.

Sainty was definitely in the game in the fourth quarter and came within one point during the period. They found it necessary to foul the Wildcats to gain possession of the ball but when the final buzzer sounded Wallace County had a 60-56 win.

"The loss to Sharon Springs was a frustrating loss, because we played pretty well, but just couldn't cool off their shooters," Coach Jeff Beims said.

The Indians had 30 rebounds Monday night with 11 offensive and 19 defensive. Dylan Peter led the way with 13. The Indians collected only three steals in the game with Brett Lampe having two of them.
