Longtime Bethune, Colo., resident, Amelia Christina Meyer died on Feb. 26, 2011, at the Grace Manor Care Center in Burlington, Colo.

She was born on Jan. 8, 1917, to Gottlieb and Katherine (Zwegardt) Beringer near St. Francis, Kan. She was the oldest of three children. She was baptized in the Christian faith on Jan. 22, 1917, at Salem Lutheran Church, the country church northwest of St. Francis.

Amelia got her schooling through the sixth grade in a one-room schoolhouse. She went to school with a horse and buggy and later drove a Model A Ford the 4 miles to school. She grew up on the family farm doing chores, milking cows, and feeding the chickens and calves. Being the oldest, she often times had to help her father in the field, weeding corn, shocking feed and stacking it, and shucking corn at harvest time. She pulled a header barge with a team of horses then would gather up the wheat and haul and stack it.

She was confirmed with a class of 18 on June 21, 1931, at Salem Lutheran. She enjoyed singing and sang in the church choir for eight years.

Amelia married Reuben Meyer on Sept. 7, 1939, at Salem Lutheran Church by Pastor O. H. Zeilinger. This pastor baptized, confirmed and married her. She then joined Immanuel Lutheran Church and was an active and faithful member of the church.

To this union one son, Jerry George, was born on May 16, 1942. At the age of 13, a cousin, Alma Beringer came to live with Reuben and Amelia after the death of her parents and sister, Irene in an automobile accident.

Amelia loved to bake and cook and one of her hobbies was collecting recipes. She enjoyed embroidery, gardening and caring for her flowers. She also canned many fruits and vegetables.

Amelia was preceded in death by her husband, Reuben, brother, Edwin, cousin, Alma, two brothers-in-law and two sisters-in-law.

She is survived by her son, Jerry of Bethune, sister, Clara Meyer of Bethune, sister-in-law, La Vera Beringer of St. Francis, a very special adopted granddaughter, Connie Reynolds of Billings, Mont., and a host of nieces and nephews, relatives and friends.

Funeral services for Amelia were held at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday, March 3, at the Immanuel Lutheran Church north of Bethune with Pastor Beth Ann Doerring officiating.

Pallbearers were Paul Bishop, Larry Beringer, Mark Beringer, Eric Meyer, George Robben and Brit Robben.

Honorary pallbearers were Joe Bohnen, Michael Bohnen, Danny Wiess and Arnold Srobel.

Burial followed in the Immanuel Lutheran Cemetery.

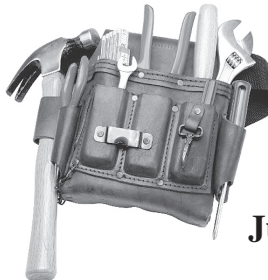

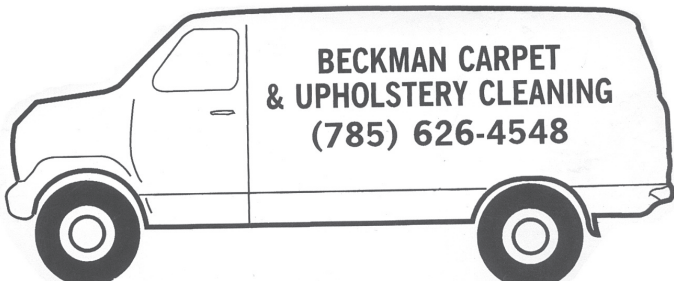

Cancer walk planned

Walkers will go around the clock to fight cancer during the American Cancer Society Relay For Life of Cheyenne County. This celebration of life brings the numerous groups and individuals concerned about cancer together in an effort to fight back.

Teams will gather at Sawhill Park overnight to join the fight against cancer from 6 p.m. Saturday, June 11, until 6: a.m. Sunday, June 12.

The American Cancer Society Relay For Life is a life-changing event that brings together more than 3.5 million people every year to celebrate the lives of those who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and empower individuals and communities to fight back against a disease that takes so much.

Relay For Life opens as cancer survivors and caregivers walk or use a wheel chair to complete the first lap. This is an emotional time that sets the stage of the importance of each participant's contribution. A festive atmosphere develops around the track. As walkers make new friends and spent time with old ones, the Relay heats up and camp-out begins. An atmosphere of camaraderie is crated with team members entertaining each other: eating, playing

games and, of course, walking for a great cause.

Highlighting the evening is the luminaria ceremony that takes place after dark to honor cancer survivors and to remember those lost. Luminaria line the track and are let burning throughout the night to remind participants of the importance of their efforts.

"Relay For Life is as much an awareness raiser about the progress against cancer as it is a fundraiser," said Pat Rose, event chair. "Many of the participants will be people who have dealt with cancer themselves. Their involvement is proof of the progress that has been made in improving cancer survival rates and the quality of life following cancer treatment."

"The funds raised will enable us to continue our investment in the fight against cancer by helping people stay well, by helping people get well by finding cures, and by fighting back," said Ms. Rose.
