or use more local option budget funds which comes from local taxes.

The legislators seem to think it's alright for the school board to tax the local people, he said, but the state doesn't want to raise the taxes.

For the second year, there will be no summer school. Nathan Smith was hired to run the weight program this summer. The St. Francis Recreation Commission will pay for half of his salary.

The board approved to continue the kindergarten through sixth grade Title I program next year. This is a federally-funded program.

The board agreed to offer contracts to all those licensed and non-licensed personnel who had not resigned with the exception of Mrs. Schmid and others who are not contracted.

Book fees go up

The board agreed to raise the book fee \$5 for each student. Instead of \$25, Junior-senior high students will pay a \$30 book fee; the kindergarten students will pay \$20 instead of \$25; and grade school students will pay \$30 instead of \$25.

Meals will also go up 10 cents. junior-senior high students will pay \$1.65 for breakfast and \$2.20 for lunch. Grade school students will pay \$1.35 for breakfast and Dustin enjoyed seeing friends \$1.80 for lunch. Adult prices will raise 25-cents.

Summer projects

Mr. Schiltz updated the board on several school improvement projects which will be completed before the start of school in the fall. Projects include:

• The doors at the high school are being made, Mr. Schiltz said, and they will go in shortly.

• The grade school hallway remodeling and lights will be installed the second week in June. Scott Schultz, St. Francis, will do the work.

• The high school gym lights will be installed by Travis Jensen the last week of school.

• Plans for the remodeling of the high school front entry hall by the office will be looked at.

• The high school gym floor will be refinished by Von Lintel Refinishing, Hays, by the second week in July.

The bill additionally addresses required factors in determining conditions of release, employment of city and county prisoners, relief from firearm prohibitions for a person adjudicated mentally ill, expunged records, grand juries, direct appeals to the Supreme Court, community corrections, house arrest, arrest expungement fees, driving under the influence (DUI) offender house arrest and work release, and the forfeiture of appearance bonds.

This is an example of bundling numerous bills together. Just remember all these issues were brought forward based on a suggestion from our law enforcement community, judges, corrections officials, KBI, county and district attorneys, individual legislators and citizens.

Senate Substitute for HB 2194 would modify then Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS) plan for public employees who are current members and for future public employees of the state, school and local groups. The bill would make a number of all the right words and descrip- telecommunications device and changes, most contingent upon

specific triggers, including certain actions that would have to be taken by the 2012 legislature.

Additionally we have to have a positive or favorable decision by the IRS regarding elections by Kansas Public Employees Retirement System Tier 1 and Tier 2 members to choose alternative options for their individual retirement contributions and benefits.

Hopefully these changes would bring the state, school, and local groups into actuarial balance no later than fiscal year 2019. The sources of funds are personal contributions from salary, employer contributions (taxes), and market performance (stock investments). Included in the bill is the require-

ment of adding yet another "study commission." This 13-member commission is to consider alternative retirement plans, including defined contribution plans, hybrid plans that could include a defined contribution component and any other possible plans.

The commission is required to report no later than Jan. 6 on recommendations which then would be introduced as two identical bills in each chamber, require committee debate and at least one chamber taking floor action.

The commission will consist of legislators selected by chamber leadership and five members selected by the governor; ex-officio members will include legislative staff and the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System executive director.

This is a serious issue that could potentially affect all 244,000 Kansas Public Employees Retirement System eligible members. We will see where this goes and I will keep you posted. Thanks to all of you that contacted me with comments on our proposed actions as the process unfolded.
