Mrs. Faulkender has been a teacher, psychologist, cook and nurse for first graders since she began teaching at the elementary school. She found that a little rubbing alcohol, a band aid and a Tums will cure almost anything.

"I will miss the hugs and smiles from the children," she said.

However, she might not miss the first and last two weeks of school. To begin with, both the teacher and the students are a little nervous when school begins.

The first two weeks, she said, are teaching students the rules, there are tears and big adjustments. The last two weeks of school finds the students wanting to be out. They are thinking about the summer and the swimming pool.

"I hated to see them go," she

Mrs. Faulkender was born and raised in St. Francis. After high school graduation, she went on to Fort Hays State University where, in 1971, she graduated with a degree in early childhood education.

That same year, she returned to St. Francis to teach kindergarten. I was so excited, she said. I was teaching in the same classroom that I had attended kindergarten in. However, in December, she found out she was pregnant and, after finishing the year out, she was out of a job.

A year and a half later, she began teaching ABC Preschool in the Methodist Church Educational Building. For nine years, she taught 3- to 5-year-olds their colors, ABCs and how to get along with each other.

When she had the opportunity to come back to the elementary, she turned the school over to Shirley Swihart.

I always knew my calling was early childhood education but I never would have dreamed the joys teaching brought into my life, she said. It has been such a pleasure and privilege to be a part of so many kids' lives.

There were some fun times and kids were always saying something funny. Then there were times when she would comfort the student who had a tragedy in their

Wheat plot tour set

The Cheyenne County wheat plot tour will be held starting at 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 15. The plot, belonging to Junior, Tom and Matt Smull, is located south of Wheeler on K-27, Rd. 1,

We will discuss 20 varieties, including SY Gold and Cedar, said Jeanne Falk, K-State multi-county agronomist. These are new releases from Syngenta and WestBred.

There is also a seeding rate study in the plots this year, with TAM 111 and seeding rates of 35 to 75 pounds per acre. Discussing the strengths and weaknesses of varieties and their fit for this area will be Jim Shroyer, K-State wheat specialist.

We will also have a presentation by Alan Schlegel, K-State agronomist at the K-State Research Center at Tribune. He will be discussing crop rotations with wheat and can answer questions about no-till wheat. Mr. Schlegel has several long-term studies with crop rotations and various tillage methods.

Supper will follow at Goodland Greenline at Wheeler. It will be sponsored by the Cheyenne County grain dealers and beverages for the plot tour are sponsored by the Kansas Wheat Alliance.
