Grass range school set for Aug. 23-25

Coalition's (KGLC) mid-/shortgrass range school will be held August 23-25 at Camp Lakeside, Scott County State Lake, and The Nature Conservancy's Smoky Valley Ranch.

Why do some native grasses and forbs prefer shallow soils? Why do the plants in low-lying areas or along stream sides look different from upland plants? Why don't all native grasses and forbs respond to grazing pressure the same? What can I do to keep invasive plants out of my pastures? The speakers hope to help students answer these and other questions.

To start each school, all students are asked to state their interests in a day on the TNC ranch which attending the school and what they hope to learn to take home and use on their ranch.
