Archery shoot planned

Mobe's Archery Supply of St. Francis, KS will be holding an Iron Buck archery contest July 30. Archers will have five arrows, of their choice, to shoot at various Iron animal targets at unknown ranges. The Iron targets will have a 3-inch layered foam insert located where the animals vitals would be. There will also be a 1-inch layered foam inserts above that for higher difficulty in case of a shoot off would occur. Here's how it works, each archer will get five arrows, shooters provides, at the start of the contest. There will be a walk thru course on a river bottom setting with the targets set along the walk path at various unknown ranges. The hunter will be given the range on

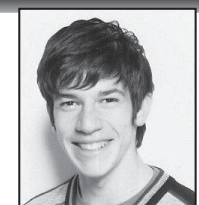
the first target to make things a little easier. As long as the hunter still has arrows in their quiver, they are still in the contest. If they do not hit the insert on the target your arrows will break, last archer standing with arrows in his/her quiver wins the contest. There is an entry fee per shooter. Lunch, beverages and access to the practice range will be included with the shooters entry fee. Any spectators will be charged \$6 for lunch and \$1 for beverages. Lunch will consist of brisket, baked beans and potato salad. Prizes will be awarded to the top four in the contest. There will be other archery games participants can engage in while they wait to shoot the walk-

thru course. There will have a 100-yard shot contest. This will cost \$1 per arrow with an unlimited number of arrows per contestant. The closest arrow to the 10x ring on a 48-inch target wins one dozen gold tip pro hunter shafts. There will also be three lanes of milk jug shoot offs. There will be two milk jugs filled with water at 20 yards, mounted on a pulley system. Two shooters compete against each other, first shooters milk jug to hit the ground loses. No broad heads only field points are allowed in this game. Any questions should be addressed to Mobe's Archery Supply (Josh Moberly) at 970-630-1196. Don't forget to bring lots of arrows.

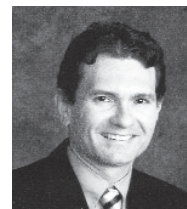
