## Increasing water rates in the city of Bird City

ORDINANCE NO. 326

AN ORDINANCE INCREASING WATER RATES IN THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS; PROVIDING FOR AND FIXING THE RATES TO BE CHARGED FOR WATER SOLD BY THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS; AMENDING SECTION 3-105 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS, AND REPEALING SAID SECTION AS THEY EXISTED PRIOR TO THE ADOPTION OF THIS ORDINANCE;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Section 13-105 of the code of the City of Bird City, Ordinance No. 307 of the City of Bird City, Kansas is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 13-105. RATES. The City Council has established the fol-

lowing rates for water uses and sewer: a) A base rate of \$33.60 per month per meter for a minimum

- usage of up to 5000 gallons per month;
- b) Water usage over 5000 gallons per month would be charged at the rate of \$2.80 per thousand gallons per month over 5000 gallons plus the minimum base rate.
- c) The sewer rate shall be \$19.60 per month.

SECTION 2. Existing Section 13-105 of the Code of the City of Bird City, all such sections existing prior to the adoption of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall be included and incorporated in the Code of Ordinance of the city of Bird City, Kansas, 1998, as an addition or amendment thereto, and shall be appropriately renumbered to conform to the uniform numbering systems of the

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall become effective for the next billing cycle and be in full force and effect after its publication in the official city newspaper.



We hope to test what forage varieties could be a viable option for producers to graze livestock on. In addition, we hope to get an idea of preference and palatability of the forages by cattle grazing the plot. In an exclusion area, the pounds of forage per acre will be deter-

There are 13 plot treatments - Wheats: Longhorn, TAM 112. Jagger, and Jagger+turnips; Triticale: ThunderCale, Thunder-Cale V, ThunderTall, Forrunner. Forrunner+turnips; Barley: P919, Verdant, Verdant+turnips; and Rye. There are three replications of the plots. The seeding rate is approximately 60 pounds per acre for the grains and 3 pounds per pound for the turnips. There will be signs put up this fall identifying each treatment, so producers can begin to utilize and learn from

We are planning to have a field day in the spring. There, we plan to have guest speakers and producers will learn about the options for small grain forages and how to utilize them in their production

We hope the forage plot will be an annual project so we can gather data over an extended time period. The information we get from the plot will be able to be used by producers. so they can plant forages that work well as an alternative livestock feed in Northwest Kansas.


