The Gardener

One of my most vivid memories of the backyard garden as a kid was saving seed from some of the vegetables we grew each year. When I look back on that project now, a smile always comes to my face. Those were hard times, those years of the 30s and early 40s. A packet of just about any kind of seed probably cost at least a dime, and a dime in those days would buy a loaf of bread or a small sack of sugar. So we would save the seeds from some of the vegetables to plant in next year's garden and save a few dimes for other essential uses. I can remember my parents watching for the largest and sweetest cantaloupe or watermelon, the best looking cucumber, or the nicest looking pumpkin, and when the goodie had been removed and eaten, the seeds would be spread out on a newspaper, dried thoroughly, and then stored in fruit jars for next year's plantings. Several different species of flowers were given the same treatment. And the crops the following year were just as good as always, and we saved quite a few dimes. I thought about those days this summer when I picked a big, beautiful Ambrosia cantaloupe. But I didn't save the seed, despite the fact that a packet of Ambrosia cantaloupe seed next spring will cost me at least \$3.50. You see, an Ambrosia cantaloupe is a hybrid, and if I were to plant this year's production of seeds next year, no telling what I might get. But you can be sure that any production you might get would not be true to the species. The same would be true for Sweet Success cucumbers, Celebrity or Northern Exposure tomatoes, Maestro peas, or Derby green beans. Those are all my favorites today, and all are hybrids. All are much more productive than Straight Eight cucumbers, Little Marvel peas, Kentucky Wonder beans; or Brandywine, Sioux, Rutgers or Marglobe tomatoes. Those are all open pollinated, the kind we used to plant before hybrids came on the scene in the 50s and 60s. Those old timers are still available, but none of them can approach the growth habit or production of the hybrids, although many gardeners will argue that the oldies taste better than the newer models. So, I do not save seeds like my parents did. Unfortunately, there are gardeners today who will save some of this year's seed and plant it next year, expecting to duplicate this year's production. That cannot happen unless you harvested

the seed from open pollinated parents. The sad part of the story is that it is occasionally difficult to determine which packet of seed is hybrid and which is open pollinated. Read the information printed on the seed packet before you buy. Most seed catalogs will give you the information in their description of the seed. The rule of thumb should be... if it's a hybrid, forget about sav-

ing the seed. If it's an open pollinated "heirloom" variety, feel free to save enough seed for next year's plantings. Hey! Time marches on, and as a result of that march, next week's rantings in this space will be the last of the season. Please hold the applause. Watch for my season ending special offer that just might be of value next spring!

Board of education publishes resolution

Published in the Bird City Times, Bird City, Kansas, Thursdays, October 13, and October 20, 2011. (41-42)

WHEREAS:

The Board of Education of Cheylin USD No. 103, Cheyenne/Rawlins County, State of Kansas, is authorized by K.S.A. 72-8801 as amended by 1988 HB 2882, to make an annual tax levy for a period of time not exceeding three years in an amount not to exceed six mills upon the assessed tangible taxable property in the district for the purpose specified in said law; and

WHEREAS:

Board of Education has determined to exercise the authority vested in it by said law;

NOW THEREFORE:

Be It Resolved That:

The above-named school board shall be authorized to make an annual tax levy for a period not to exceed three years in an amount not to exceed six mills upon the assessed taxable tangible property in such school district for the purpose of acquisition, construction, reconstruction, repair, remodeling, additions to, furnishing and equipping of buildings necessary for school district purposes, including housing and boarding pupils enrolled in an area vocational school operated under the board, architectural expenses incidental thereto, the acquisition of building sites, the undertaking and maintenance of asbestos control projects, the acquisition of school buses and the acquisition of other equipment and for the purpose of paying a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, for the financing of redevelopment projects upon property located within the school district. The tax levy authorized by this resolution may be made, unless petition in opposition to the same, signed by not less than 10% of the qualified electors of the school district, is filed with the county election officer of the home county of the school district within 40 days after the last publication of this resolution. In the event a petition is filed, the county election officer shall submit the question of whether the tax levy shall be authorized to the electors in the school district at an election called for the purpose or at the next general election, as is specified by the Board of Education of Cheylin USD 103.

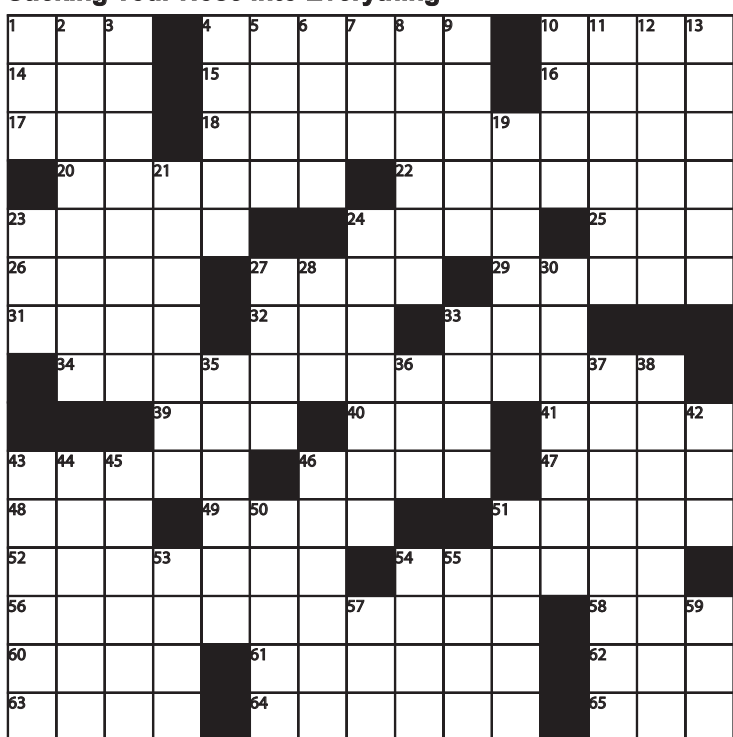
