Audit, financial and operating reports were presented by Dale Weeks, manager. For the fiscal year ended May 31, the company reported a profit of over \$400,000. Mr. Weeks discussed the cash portion of the patronage, stock payout for members over 80 years of age, and a revolv-

ing stock payout program for the company.

Mr. Weeks also reviewed the operations of the previous year, noting the number of bushels handled, number of railcars and trucks shipped, the installation of new equipment, and general operations of the company.

"We are a strong company," Mr. Weeks said. "We've worked hard this past year. That's what we


