Medicare beneficiaries will soon be reviewing their choices in Medicare Part D prescription drug plans. This has been a wonderful benefit for seniors to help in their medication needs. However, this has also opened the door for new and unprecedented fraud attempts.

Protecting your personal information is the best line of defense in the fight against healthcare fraud and abuse.

Here are some ways to take an active role in your healthcare benefits:

Protect your Medicare or Medicaid number as you would your credit card or bank information. Don't give out your personal information, such as your Medicare, Medicaid or Social Security number, bank account numbers or credit card numbers to anyone you do not completely trust.

• Medicare and Medicaid do not sell or endorse any product. If someone calls you or visits your home and tells you that he or she represents Medicare or Medicaid, they are lying and cannot be trusted. Hang up the shrewd to be rude."

"We are pleased to have an 80 percent participation rate in the Rural Opportunity Zones partnership, but we hope to have a 100 percent participation rate," said Kansas Commerce Secretary Pat George. "The response to the program has been great and should only get better as the remaining counties opt in. Rural Opportunity Zones are proving to be a key incentive in recruiting individuals and families into rural Kansas."

The state tax exemption is entirely state financed, so all Rural Opportunity Zones-designated counties are automatic participants in that part of the program.
