An independent panel of entrepreneurs, community members and faculty will judge the entries and select five in both the commercial and social entrepreneurship categories as finalists.

Those finalists will attend a pitch competition on Feb. 15 for their shot at the top prize of a \$5,000 grant to develop their idea, as well as a \$20,000, four-year scholarship to attend McPherson College.
