Commissioners set meeting with operational director

karen.k@nwkansas.com Chevenne County Commissioners met with two Good Samaritan Village Advisory Board members and the Village administrator on Tuesday. The discussion found several questions unanswered and a meeting was set up with the Good Samaritan Society's operational director.

The nursing home has been under construction and renovation since the October 2010 fire. It is nearing completion and the Society has suggested selling the facility plus the apartments to the county for \$1. The renovations are almost complete and the Society has said they would run it for a year and then, if the commissioners agree, it would be taken over by the county.

Glenn Isernhagen and Ken Quigley, Village advisory board members, and Jeff Paulsen, Village administrator, asked the commissioners if they had thought about lease contracts and a process to develop a plan for future needs. Mr. Isernhagen said he was concerned that the Dec. 31 deadline would be here and there would be no plan.

Dale Patton, commissioner, said Randy Fitzgerald, the Society's director of operations, had presented a preliminary contract but there were several questions. This matter, he said, will have a dynamic effect on the county and the people. There was also the question as to when in the year the Society would run the facility. Was it one year starting at the beginning of the year or one year after the renovations are completed?

But, Mr. Isernhagen was pressing the fact that he felt there needed to prepared to do this day-in and daybe some start on the plans soon, if

Andy Beikman, commissioner, said it was the commissioners understanding after one of Mr. Fitzgerald's visits that, in order for the facility to be turned over to the county, there had to be the added assisted living and, if the county wasn't going to add it, then the

Society wouldn't turn it over. Mr. Paulsen said that was not his perception.
