Electric rates expected to increase soon

There's no two ways about itelectricity prices are going up!

The city's power supply contract with the Kansas Municipal Energy Agency expired at the end of 2011, and the city has now signed a new 10-year contract with Praithe power supply to be provided by Sunflower Electric.

In the late 70s, the city of St. Francis was instrumental, along with four other northwest Kansas communities, in establishing the Kansas Municipal Energy Agency. The agency's purpose was to pro-

vide it's members with the necessary experience and expertise to address their options regarding electric power sources. The agency now has over 60 member cit-

As a result of its membership in rie Land Electric Cooperative for Kansas Municipal Energy Agency, the city was able to access a hydro power source through the Western Area Power Administration which amounted to approximately twothirds of the city's needs. The cost of this power was less than that provided from the city's other pri-
