Still no entertainment set for Thursday night of fair

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As of the night of the Thursday night meeting, the Cheyenne County Fair Board noted that there was still no grandstand entertainment lined up.

At the February meeting, they had talked to Chris Bracelin and Rob Schiltz to get more information on motorcross events and possibly use that entertainment for Thursday of the fair. The only rules they had were from Nebraska. Kari Gilliland, county attorney, said that she would not approve having the races if they couldn't get a set of Kansas rules for her to review.

Gary Cooper, board member, said he had the name of a contact person and he would see if he could get ahold of him. If the motor cycle event falls through, the board agreed that they could always fall back on a ranch rodeo event. However, those participating will need to have some advance notice.

Adam Peter, board member, suggested a beer garden and dance be held that night. Dick Bursch, president, said the commissioners said there is to be no alcohol on the fairgrounds. Besides, he said, the fair is geared toward kids and having alcohol on the grounds would not be recommended.

Other grandstand events during the fair includes: Wednesday, team roping; Friday, Tuff Trucks; Saturday, demolition derby.

Mr. Bursch reminded members that volunteers to work gates are needed but people taking money must have a fair board member working with them.

The board, at the last meeting, had agreed to hire Curtis Duncan for announcing the derby. Margo Douthit had also offered to do some announcing. The board agreed to have Ms. Douthit announce the Tuff Trucks event.

Mr. Bursch urged the members of the different committees to have a meeting at least once a month so they are ready by fair time.

The board agreed to let the St. Francis Fire Department bring a fire truck down to the fair grounds so they could demonstrate the trucks and talk to people about safety.

Extension agent's report

Marty Fear, extension agent, asked that the livestock scales be certified by April 25. He said Shane Wurm also wanted someone to certify his scales. He could help pay for the mileage for those coming to do the work.

He said that 16 ads in the fair book had been sold for \$700. The book, he said, is pretty well done. There are several changes in the book and they will be printed in the newspaper in the near future.

Belt buckles are awarded in some of the classes. Two people had talked to Mr. Fear about sponsoring buckles. The board agreed to see if all the buckles could be sponsored.

The livestock judges have been lined up, Mr. Fear said. He will get the other judges later. Lining up the livestock judges needs to be done early.

He had been to a meeting in Goodland and, after listening to some of the other agents, he wondered if the insurance policy covering the fair events, livestock and people involved was adequate. Mr. Bursch asked him to look into the coverage.

In other business

In other business:

- Krien Building will fix the corners of Jenkins Hall for \$450.

- Shawna Blanka was given permission to use the arena for a barrel racing event.

- David Morrow was hired to do the mowing and weed eating on the grounds. He charges \$50 an hour and will work when needed.

- The conservation office personnel has been doing a lot of "nice" work on the grounds.

- Several of the board members will meet Mr. Bursch to do the dirt work to level the ground and spread rocks.

- Drew Flemming, board member, said he needed some help with the crows nest in the arena. It was noted that Gordon Ross, owner of Ross Manufacturing, had volunteered to furnish some equipment and a man to operate it. Drew will talk to Gordon.

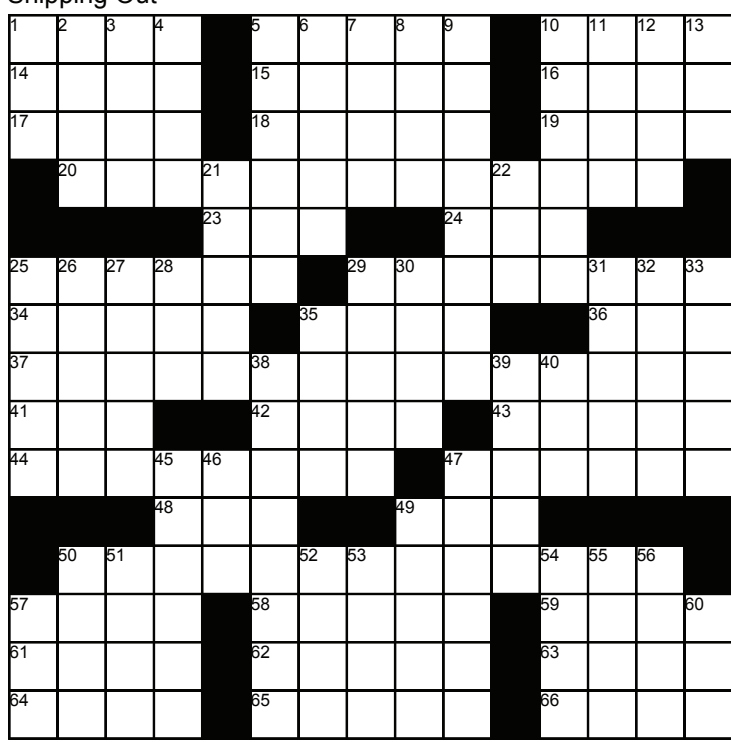
- The board approved for Mr. Cooper to purchase some stop watches that can be read in the dark.

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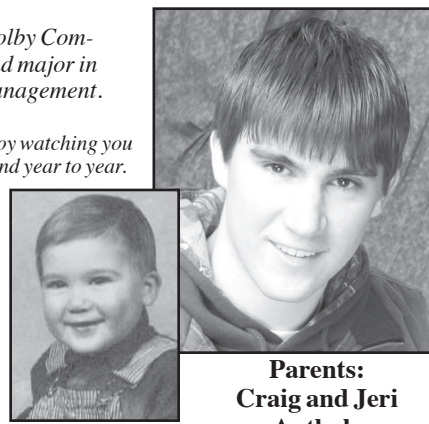
Congratulate Your Graduate
