History of high school principal told

Editor's note: The St. Francis Community High School Alumni will be held in June. Several writers have been writing articles concerning the history of the school. The first is about Garnette Greene who was a principal many will remember.


Garnette E. Greene served the St. Francis Community High School as principal from 1930 to 1957. A strong academic, athletic and activities program developed in those 27 years under his creative and visionary leadership. The arts: music, writing, drama flourished during these years. Bonnie Cram noted that Mr. Greene could have been a concert violinist, but chose education instead.

Athletics was also a high priority with Mr. Greene. He introduced wrestling in 1932 and coached the team until 1935. Through his efforts wrestling was accepted as a regular sport in the Northwest Kansas Athletic League. Wrestling became popular with young men and adults in the rural area and is credited with increasing the number of boys who attended high school. Girls soon followed to take advantage of the variety of activities offered.

Most of these remained in school to obtain a diploma. In 1996 his name was added to Kansas Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame.

Unlike predecessors, Mr. Greene stressed the fact that athletes must keep up their grades in at least three subjects in order to participate in interscholastic sports. "Scholarship is what the schools are for....." *Cheyenne Indian News*, Feb. 19, 1936. In past years athletes had actually been given grades for playing football.

Mr. Greene's interest in his students impacted their lives. The story is told of a young freshman farm boy, who swaggered down Main Street boasting a tough attitude and smoking a Red Dot cigar. "Pop" Greene, as he was affectionately called behind his back, called the boy into his office and said, "Young man, you'd make a great football player. However, you will have to give up cigar smoking and change your attitude to be on the team." That young man, Warren Northrup, dropped cigar smoking and his swagger and became a four-year football and wrestling letterman. Following high school he joined the U. S. Army

and was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the Battle of the Bulge.

In 1937 Mr. Greene advised students that in this fast moving world "unless one is well informed it is almost impossible to secure a desirable position." He assured them by adding, "Your community high school is well equipped to give you a superior education." *Cheyenne Indian News*, May 14, 1937.

According to the *Cheyenne Indian News*, Sept. 21, 1938, Mr. Greene expected quality from his teachers. "A progressive step insisted on by Principal Greene is that each teacher keeps a carefully detailed and organized plan for the day's work that can be placed on file in the office each day."

While he was principal, a gymnasium, library, principal's office, classrooms, and auditorium were constructed. A modern music addition was begun in his last year.

According to the *Cheyenne Indian News*, Nov. 11, 1938. "Garnette E. Greene's accomplishment in building up the St. Francis Community High School system is an inspirational success story. A fine new building has been added, enrollment built up, curriculum broadened and new activities begun. Evidence of top results in diversified fields and a tribute to good generalship can well be found in the fact that last year the St. Francis system led the league in athletics. A Cappella work and publication activities." This excellence continued throughout his tenure at St. Francis Community High School.

He laid the foundation for quality education that continues to this day.

Mr. Greene and his wife established a scholarship fund, which has awarded thousands of dollars to Cheyenne County students since 1989.

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
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AIDEN MEYER received a ball at the Easter Egg Hunt held in St. Francis on Saturday. Each child at the event received a toy.
