Rent needed for signs at fairgrounds

None of the Cheyenne County Fair Board members could remember, for sure, when the signs on the fences at the fairgrounds were either painted on or attached. This was a matter discussed at the last fair board meeting and was again discussed at the board meeting on Thursday evening.

Brian Hobrock, board member, had inventoried the signs. He said some of the businesses painted on the fence were no longer in business, others that were still in business were in bad shape and a few were in excellent shape.

Whatever the shape, the board was pretty sure that no rent had been collected for the signs in years. In fact, they weren't positive as to how much they had charged.

After considerable discussion, they decided to send letters to those people who were still in business.

If their sign was painted on the fence, they would need to replace it with one that is bolted on. Also, if it needed repainted, they would be told that.

The signs on the south and west fence outside the arena, would need to be a 4- by 8-foot sign. Those on the inside of the arena would need to be 2- by 8-feet.

The inside of the arena, they said, is a better location but, since these signs were smaller, they decided that those having signs would be charged \$100 rent for the space. They are also responsible for having their sign painted and repainted when needed.

They then turned to painting the fence where signs were painted on. They couldn't decide whether to strip it, prime in and repaint it or see if power washing would take the lettering off. They decided to try power washing it to begin with.
