Terry Miller, election officer, reported that there will be two races in the primary held Aug. 7. Three candidates will be running for the seat of register of deeds and two are running for county commissioner in District 3.

Filing for register of deeds are Shelley Culwell, Jeanne Dunn and Melissa Tabor. Running for commissioner in District 3 are incumbent, Andy Beikman, and Brett Poling.

The seat of commissioner of District 2 is currently held by Dale Patton who has filed as an Independent so will be on the general ballot.

Others who will appear on the primary ballot are: Terry Miller, county clerk; Dolores Jenik, county treasurer; Karan Thadani, county attorney; Cody Beeson, sheriff; and Robert Van Allen, magistrate judge, District 15.

All candidates are Republican with the exception of Mr. Patton who is an Independent.
