Manager asks that taxes be waved

The St. Francis city council met on Monday, June 11. Ilene O'Leary, manager of Cheyenne Manor, was the council's visitor, asking that taxes be waved for the year, which was approved. They also visited with her awhile about federal funding and utility

For the Attorney report, city attorney Michael Day said he had done some research into the national flood plain insurance program and he thinks the city should also participate for a variety of reasons, such as eligibility of flood insurance for homeowners.




