Birdhouse look proposed for water tower

The water tower in Bird City sion show, Pastor Tom said. His needs repainted and it is estimated that the cost to paint it gray will be around \$18,000. Tom Bailey, pastor of Immanuel United Methodist Church, and Cathy Domsch, executive director, Century II, presented a new and unique plan for repainting the tower at the Monday city council meeting.

Pastor Tom asked the question, "What do Sesame Street's Big Bird and television's Extreme Makeover" have in common with Bird City?"

The answer was, "Why not paint it to look like a bird house?"

It could be what makes Bird City a stopping point as people come to see the "World's largest bird house," he said. "Come to Bird City and see the world's largest birdhouse!"

The plan presented was to wrap the water tower with a vinyl wrap to look like a giant bird house. Vinyl typically outlasts paint and is less prone to fading.

It was suggested that the design of the giant birdhouse could be opened to international competition with an award for the chosen design.

So, now, what does Sesame Street have to do with Bird City's water tower? Perhaps, he said, Sesame Street's Big Bird could be invited for the celebration and the unveiling of the water tower. We City, he said.

DeAnza Ambrosier, city clerk, gave the 1921 blueprints of the water tower to Pastor Tom. Copies of the blueprints along with digital photos of the water tower were sent to Mr. Hess. He estimated that the cost of the project would be from \$21,000 to \$25,000.

The cost would include wrapping the tower from the catwalk to the bottom of the roof. Once the design is approved, it would take about two weeks to print, laminate and install.
