Lightning strike fire burns approximately 300 acres

karen.k@nwkansas.com Despite the rain on Saturday, Francis fire chief. the Cheyenne County Commissioners, at a special budget meeting on Monday, said the burn ban throughout the county was still in effect.

The rain gave the St. Francis volunteer firemen a rest after weeks of being out almost every day and, on some days, two and three times.

Firemen had responded to a fire in Sherman County and, on their way back to St. Francis, saw a glow, indicating a fire to the west. Through Thursday, firemen were called out four times to extinguish flames which kept popping up across the pasture, much of it due to a steady wind.

The clouds were around all day Saturday and temperatures were hot but not 100 or above like it had been for days. About 9 p.m., clouds heavy with rain could be seen coming in southwest of St. Francis. Within a half an hour, there was thunder and lots of lightning and it started to rain.

Severe thunderstorms with hail and possible flooding were predicted by the National Weather Service but, little if any hail was reported and no flooding.

Throughout the night, there was more thunder and lightning and it continued to rain, sometimes in torrents, sometimes gently falling.

North and northwest of St. Francis, there was more rain with 3- to 4-inches falling. Dale Patton, about 9 miles northwest, reported 4.2-inches rain. A mile north, Dennis Krien had 4 inches. Salem Lutheran Church which is between the Krien's and Patton's farms received 3.5 inches. again.

Pete Kinen, northwest of St. Francis on K-27, reported around 3 inches. Straight north, Bob Ochsner reported 3 inches and the sides of the roads were washed with deep gullies.

Southeast of St. Francis, Andy Beikman received 3.60-inches rain. South of town, John Lampe had 2 inches. West of St. Francis, A.J. Jones had a lower report of 1.5 inces.

In St. Francis, Kathy Woodcox, weather observer, reported 1.71-inches rain Saturday night and a trace on Sunday morning. She also had .18 inch recorded on July 4.

Overall, it was a much needed drink for the pastures, crops and lawns.

Mrs. Woodcox, on July 4, had a high of 104 degrees but temps had cooled down to 77 degrees on Sunday, July 8. People woke up to a very pleasant 54 degrees on Tuesday morning.

The National Weather Service is predicting temperatures to be no higher than in the lower 90s this week and a chance of rain over the weekend. However, by the first of the week, the weather forecasters are looking at high 90s
